Continue Resistance in Manila Battle; Japs Claim to Be 20 Miles from City

Pushing Troops Back In Northern Sector; Results in Offensive

British Patrols Take Offensive Action Against Some of Jap Invaders of Malaya; Pressure on Penak Front Slight; Accept Issue Of Battle Wherever Nipponese Are Found.

Singapore, Dec. 31.—(AP)—British headquarters said today that "offensive actions have been taken with good results" by British patrols against some of the Japanese invaders of Malaya and that pressure on the Penak front was slight.

One Plane Shot Down.—"Enemy aircraft made some dive-bombing attacks on our communications, causing little damage. One plane was shot down by our light machine-gun fire."

Raiders Appear Again.—Japanese raiders appeared again at Singapore during the night, causing damage officially described as very slight.

Alircraft of the R. A. F. bombed the airbase at Sempang Patani (occupied by the Japanese in the first invasion) last night.

Damage was estimated at \$75,000 to \$100,000.
