Our armed forces in Hawaii were suffering from a simple malady: they believed that it couldn't happen there.

In spite of this, the thing was done. An hour and ten minutes before the attack occurred, a navy destroyer and plane carrier sailed to attack Pearl Harbor.

A little more sense of peril, of reality, of alarm, in the days before the attack, and finally, the minutes before the attack would have changed the entire story.

This sense of real alarm, was lacking at Pearl Harbor, even as it was lacking throughout most of America.

There is nothing left of the Pearl Harbor attitude by the Far East today. The news of the moment is how American army and navy members, cooperating with Dutch bombers, and with units of the American Pacific Fleet, have been turning the Macassar Straits into a graveyard for Japanese hopes of unlimited expansion.

Throughout the Far East there is a vast unity and efficiency of effort, from the American and British forces who have blasted the Japanese from the skies over Hongkong to the lines still holding in Malaya and on the Bataan Peninsula.

It is too early to hope for complete and immediate victory from these developments, but the fact remains that, on every front except the Philippines, the past few days have seen demonstrations of increased Allied strength in the air, where the whole campaign can be won or lost.
