Record Increase Noted As Board of Assessors Completes Evaluating—Is Result of Heavy Building Program as Well as Larger Stocks.

The increase over the 1940 list is \$2,262,511, nearly 20 per cent above the previous grand list which was \$37,431,424.

Due to the heavy construction program during the past year, the greatest increase in this year's list are about the houses, motor vehicles, mills and manufacturing and miscellaneous, the latter including increased stocks on hand under several categories.

Second Increase This year's increase of slightly more than three per cent in millions of dollars is said to be the largest since 1929. The increase in the value of real estate is not recorded in this year's list.

This year's grand list, from 9,269 to 10,410, is 12,441 more than the 1940 list. This represents about one-quarter on the book of the previous year.

Unprecedented increase in the tax list has forced upon the Board of Assessors a heavy duty in completing the list in the specified legal time.

Marine Flyer Again in Air

San Diego, Calif. — Dangling in mid-air from a fouled parachute, Lt. Walter S. Osipoff, of the U. S. Marine, had a hair-raising experience last May. His rescue by two Navy flyers was one of the sensational stories of the month.

Now he is out of the Navy hospital and parachute jumping again. He carried a second parachute, but it did not open because the lower part of his body was tangled in the lines of the fouled chute. Two diving Naval aviators, Lieut. W. J. Levery and R. McCanta, saw an aviator's plane in the sky through the door of a transport plane.

Caught in Shrouds His parachute opened automatically and the shroud caught on a static line cable beneath the fuselage. Then followed a half-hour of the most agonizing experience of his life. He carried a second parachute, but it did not open because the lower part of his body was tangled in the lines of the fouled chute. Two diving Naval aviators, Lieut. W. J. Levery and R. McCanta, saw an aviator's plane in the sky through the door of a transport plane.

Maneuvering their plane beneath Osipoff, McCanta dragged the dangling officer into the cockpit. He cut the main parachute and the nose of their plane at the entangling shroud and cut them through the shroud. McCanta declared the rescue in a night of the most heroic kind ever made, but Osipoff thought no less of mortal due to his experience. His body was a cast for three months.

Batavia, N.E.I., Jan. 29.—(P)—Japanese forces driving down the west coast of Borneo and the Japanese invasion fleet in Macassar Strait tonight appeared to be clearing the way for a major offensive against Java, heart of the Dutch East Indies and site of the United Nations' South-East Asia command. Today's Dutch communique reported a two-pointed Japanese thrust toward Pontianak, chief city on the west coast of Dutch Borneo, situated only 200 miles inland from the sea. The Japanese, it was reported, had landed 500 troops at Pontianak, and were clearing a rail line to the city. From informed sources the news agency Ansa learned that the Japanese convoy in Macassar straits, despite the heavy losses it has suffered in the last six days, is trying to push farther south to the bottom of the strait from here these sources said, the convoy would separate for simultaneous attacks on Macassar, Banjarmasin and the Celebes capital of Makassar. The Dutch naval base of Boeraboe, located 100 miles north of the principal Dutch base of Soerabaja, across the Java sea. 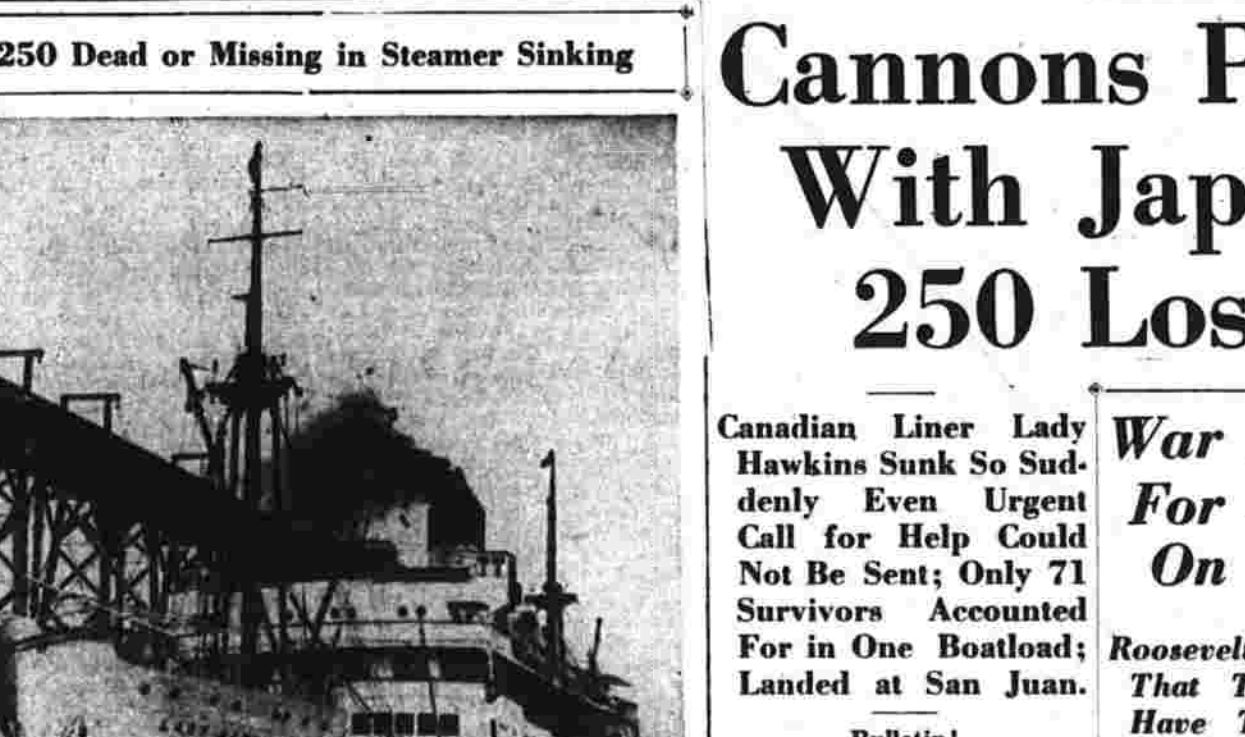

First function of the committee will be promotion of unified action among the groups in wartime activities. Members are the presidents of the eight Lutheran churches.
