Philippines Artillery Mows Down Japs; Australian Troops in Counter Attack

Japanese Penetrate Nearer Vital Strait; Expect Java Thrust

Japs Driving Down West Coast of Borneo And Invasion Fleet In Macassar Strait Appear to Be Clearing Way for Major Offensive Against Heart of East Indies.

Batavia, N.E.I., Jan. 29.—(AP)—Japanese forces driving down the west coast of Borneo and the Japanese invasion fleet in Macassar Strait tonight appeared to be clearing the way for a major offensive against Java, heart of the Dutch East Indies and site of the United Nations' South-East Asia command.

From informed sources the news agency Ansa learned that the Japanese convoy in Macassar straits, despite the heavy losses it has suffered in the last six days, is trying to push farther south to the bottom of the strait from here these sources said, the convoy would separate for simultaneous attacks on Macassar, Banjarmasin and the Celebes capital of Makassar.

The Dutch high command said the latest Japanese landing at Pontianak, 85 miles north of Pontianak, and by other forces who early in the Pacific war occupied Kuching, capital of Sarawak, which lies some 135 miles northeast of Pontianak and 100 miles east and slightly north of Penang.

Naval aircraft are attacking the invaders, the high command reported, and the defense forces have destroyed 14 important objectives in the endangered area. That the Dutch apparently were aware this new offensive was impending.

Montreal, Jan. 29.—(AP)—Three Americans, whose fate is not known, were included by the Canadian National Steamship Lines today in a list of more than 150 passengers, officers and crewmen known to have been aboard the torpedoed liner Lady Hawkins. Their names were listed as J. W. Benson, Malden, Mass.; J. Denney, Somerville, Mass.; and R. Payne, Boston.

San Juan, Puerto Rico, Jan. 29.—(AP)—The British liner Lady Hawkins appeared today to have inflicted the heaviest loss of life in enemy forays off United States waters, with 250 persons, including Americans, dead or missing in the torpedo sinking of the Canadian liner Lady Hawkins. Only one boatload of 71 survivors has been accounted for from the ship which sank Jan. 19 so suddenly that even an urgent call for help could not be sent.

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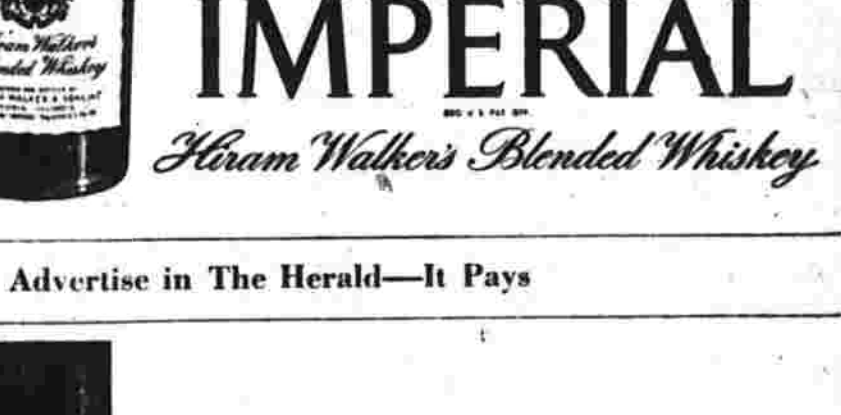

NEW AUXILIARY POLICE FORCE

Chief Gordon to Open Instruction Period Tomorrow Evening.

Chief of Police Samuel G. Gordon and his officers will gather for the first session of the Manchester Auxiliary Police school tomorrow evening in connection with local National Defense.

The new auxiliary police force will be organized in an emergency, will be required to attend an auxiliary police school and members will be required to take a course of 20 hours of initial training, consisting of 10 hours of first aid, three hours of fire defense, and three hours of first aid.

Chief Gordon will instruct in certain phases of the school and will be assisted by officers of the department as they are permitted by duty assignments.

All applicants will be required to register, provide his own transportation, note book and pencils and observe all rules and regulations pertaining to personal conduct while traveling to and attending the school.

A list of 40 applicants for the course was received at the initial meeting of the auxiliary police school last week and it is expected that others will be added.

The first session tomorrow night will be devoted to the study of the first aid course.

Report 302,000 Tons Sunk Off Canada and United States Since Beginning of War. Berlin (From German Broadcasts)—Jan. 30.—(AP)—A special communique preceded on the German radio by a fanfare of trumpets today reported that U-boats operating off the United States and Canada had sunk 43 ships totaling 302,000 tons since the beginning of the war with the United States.

Soviet Troops Menace German Winter Lines

Moscow, Jan. 30. (AP)—Cavalry-paced Soviet troops who struck lethally through fortified positions across the Donets basin today only 70 miles from the big bend of the lower Dnieper river, menacing German winter lines clear to the Sea of Azov.

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British Bag Five of Big Nazi Planes

New Dornier Bombers Failed Capable of Flying to America Destroyed in Night Raids. London, Jan. 30.—(AP)—Five of the new German Dornier 217 bombers published as being able to carry bombs to the United States have been destroyed this far this year in night raids on Britain, the air ministry said today.

Dutch Say 54 Jap Vessels Sunk; Japs Within 18 Miles of Strait

Singapore, Jan. 30.—(AP)—The British admitted today that Japanese penetration to within 18 miles of the Strait of Johore today in a communique announcing contact with the enemy about Kuala. The Japanese drive down the west coast of the Malay peninsula appeared to be keeping the previous total claimed by the Germans.
