



Washington, March 4.-(P)-The Navy's effectiveness in maintaining ocean supply lines despite enemy counter-action was credited today with driving the Axis powers to rasher tactics in their submarine campaign to divert U. S. fleet units to home waters. Naval experts said the enemy seemed to be growing more reckless in attempts to create a panicky fear of coastal raiding activities here and in Latin America. They cited as an example the shelling of Mona island, off Puerto Rico, where there was no conceivable military reason for the enemy
