Wardha, India, March 12.—(AP)—Despite the British government's announcement of plans for post-war dominion status for India, the supreme leader of Hindu Nationalists, Mohandas K. Gandhi, professed today to see no sign of settlement for the Indian question. The frail little man who renounced the title of mahatma (saintly one) and even formal leadership of the All-India Congress party, said in an interview which he defined as imperialist and undid it.

Assert U-Boat Entered Inner Harbor of Port Castria to Send Two Vessels to Bottom.

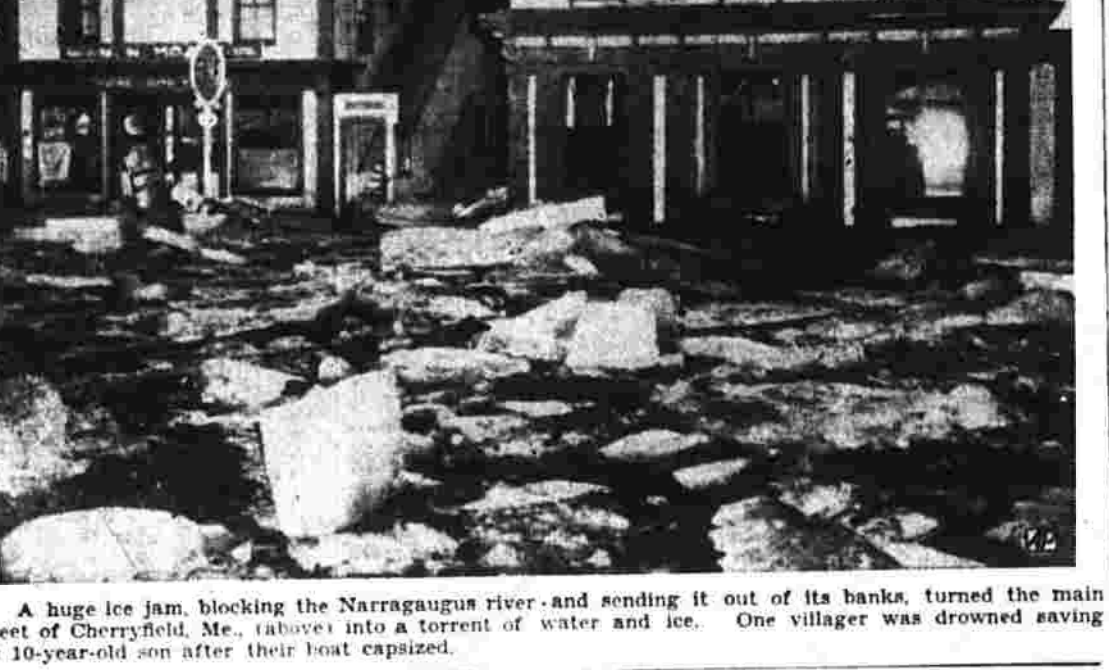
Berlin (From German Broadcasts), March 12.—(AP)—German submarines operating in North and Central American waters have sunk 17 more merchant ships totaling 109,000 tons, the German high command announced today in a special communique. A large Coast Guard vessel and a submarine chaser also were reported sunk. One Nazi submarine, the high command said, penetrated into the inner harbor of Port Castria on the British island of Santa Lucia—one of the "Windward Islands"—and sank two large ships.

On completion and passing of this course, men will be certified to train Scouts as messengers. When the Scouts are passed and certified, the supervisory reports will be to the local defense council and they are assigned to duty posts. Scouts 12 and 13 years of age will be used as Junior messengers and assigned to duty inside of buildings. Scouts 14 and over who qualify will be given full messenger rating and with their parent's permission, will be given a duty post with some outside posts.
