Hospital Plan Adopts Name

New Haven, March 13.—The Connecticut Plan For Hospital Care, non-profit public service organization adopted by 270,000 Connecticut residents to defray the cost of unexpected hospitalization, will hereafter be known as "The White Cross" plan, it was announced today by Robert D. Parnall, general manager.

Parnall said the name "White Cross" had been selected to give members a "handle" that would be more distinctive and easier to give than the full corporate name of the organization, and to distinguish it plainly from an-



Although the corporate name of the organization will be unchanged, Parnall said he "hoped members will think of their plan from now on by its new name, 'The White Cross.' It is a name which fully represents the non-profit basis and public service character of this plan, operating as it does without stock orders or paid directors.

Since its inauguration in April, 1937, the White Cross has paid hospital bills for 50,000 members at a saving to them of more than \$2,000,000, Parnall said.

Asks Hartford Try Tin Can Collection

Hartford, March 13.—The State Salvage Committee today asked the Hartford Board of Street Commissioners to stage an experimental collection of tin cans from every home in the city.

"If the test should be successful, it could be applied to other large cities in Connecticut and eventually to the smaller towns and rural areas," Mrs. Clemens, executive secretary of the committee and the War Production Board's Connecticut General Salvage Section, has written the board.

He declared, "Singapore, heart of the tin world, is lost to the enemy. It is now imperative that tin be conserved and salvaged. The supply of scrap steel in the yards of our large mills has dwindled to a few weeks, and in some cases a few days supply. It is most essential that steel also be salvaged."

Students Get Streamlined Course in Work on Farm

Mukwonago, Wis., March 13.—Some 150 students from the Milwaukee Vocational school were enrolled today in streamlined courses in farming "down on the farm" aimed at fitting them to fill shoes of many farmhands drafted in to the armed services or drafted to high-paying aerial jobs.

The experimental course, packed into five days of practical training on the 560-acre Norris Farm for Boys 20 miles from Milwaukee, combines new and scientific modes of farming with old.

Herbert Jack Morgan, for example, teaches the city kids construction and operation of the latest milking machines and also reveals construction and operation of the milch cow.

All Taught Old Method
The boys, many with no previous farm experience, all are taught the time-approved "open-cone-pull" method of extracting milk from cows, which requires only the use of two good stails to clean.

The boys take turns doing this work, maneuvering ceterpillar and two-wheel tractors, hitching, un hitching and driving horses, carrying all kinds of farm implements and such tasks.

Each class lasts two hours and the school, which opens at 7:30 a. m. when the boys are picked up by a bus in Milwaukee, lasts until 5 p. m. with an hour break at noon.

Sporules in the course must be 16 to 18 years old and weigh at least 160 pounds—husky enough for farm work. As each class completes its instruction period, they will be registered with a placement bureau.
