Find Seven Bodies In Ruins of Plant Wrecked by Blast

Bridgeport, March 30.—(P)—The broken bodies of seven persons missing in a terrific explosion at the huge Remington Arms Company munitions plant here were recovered today by grim-faced searchers who said that only two of the victims, both women, had been identified. Operations were under way at the plant Saturday, which injured 80 other persons, 10 of them mortally, when a well-timed source said.
