Washington, April 11.—(P)—Victory-flashed Japanese hammering at beleaguered Corregidor fortress from the air today while striving for a quick occupation of Cebu, the Philippines' second largest city. An invasion force estimated at 12,000 started landing yesterday on the island of Cebu on which the city is situated. The War Department reported, but met with stubborn resistance from a small American-Filipino defending force and suffered heavy casualties.

A total of about 3,000 pounds of paper was collected and delivered at the paper mill in a small truck which was driven by W. Alexander Cole in addition to the waste paper materials, one Main street merchant insisted upon donating approximately 250 pounds of scrap rubber.

The contribution of rubber was accepted and will be converted into cash by Owen Hill, a member of the Senior Chamber during the early part of next week.
