

Materiais from which it is made are said to be sufficiently abundant to supply all apparent future requirements.

Vynylite can be used for the entire record where pressings are

Vynylite can be used for the entire record where pressings are made from a master or can be employed with a glass base in cases where temporary transcriptions are taken. Tests have shown that with proper reproducing equipment the pressed records can be played thousands of times with little deterioration in quality.

Because vynylite records are softer, pressure of the reproducing needle must be two ounces or less compared with six ounces or more for ordinary records.
