New Jersey Firm Holds High Grade Zinc Output Down

Senate Patents Committee Told Nation Facing Acute Shortage; Production by Patented Process Encouraged in Other Nations.

Washington, May 1.—(AP)—Allen Dobby, a special assistant attorney general, told the Senate Patents Committee today that the New Jersey Zinc Company was restricting production of high grade zinc while the nation faces an "acute shortage." At the same time, Dobby declared, the company has encouraged unlimited production by its own patented processes in foreign countries, including Germany.

Enough for Military Use He said that after expected further curtailment of civilian consumption, War Production Board officials believe there will be enough high grade zinc for military purposes this year. "The possibility of a more acute shortage in 1943 and beyond," he added, "can only be limited by rapid expansion of our present facilities for the production of vital commodity."

High grade zinc—metal at least 99 per cent pure—is needed for shell castings, small arms ammunition and die casting parts for tanks and airplanes. The New Jersey company owns U. S. patents for vertical retort process which one of the principal and cheapest methods of producing high-grade zinc, Dobby said.

First's Policy to Limit Output Dobby declared that the company "has continuously and over a long period of years pursued a policy of limiting the production of high grade zinc in this country and the stabilization of the domestic market."

To this end, he said, the firm had prohibited its principal American licensee, E. I. duPont de Nemours and Company, from producing the high grade product and has required duPont to sell half the zinc produced under the license at a lower grade than its actual quality. By discouraging the production of high grade zinc by other firms, Dobby asserted, the New Jersey company is attempting to preserve its position in the field after the war.

Dobby explained that New Jersey Zinc requires in its license that metals be delivered to producers threatened the high purity production. This caused Senator LaFollette (Continued on Page Twelve)

Rhode Island Governor Acts as Most Serious New England Forest Fires Continue to Blaze

Rhode Island towns were placed under martial law today as the most serious New England forest fires continued to blaze after burning over 50 square miles and destroying 250,000 feet of government stored lumber. West Greenwich and Scituate, however, were placed under control, Gov. J. Howard McGrath of Rhode Island ordered the communities placed under martial law after visiting the scene.

British Raiding Tapers Off to Scout Flights

London, May 1.—(AP)—R. A. F. offensive operations tapered off to armed reconnaissance flights overnight after eight straight nights of smashing blows at Nazi bases and supply centers, but the British destroyed a total of 11 German bombers over England and France, authorities said today. Three Nazi planes were sent crashing to earth over the French coast, and another British fighter which followed them home or circled over the airfields awaiting their return.

Report Battleship Sunk Moscow, May 1.—(AP)—The Moscow radio said today that a German battleship had been sunk by Russian submarines. This was the first Russian claim of destruction of one of Germany's most capital ships, and came in a communique in which the Baltic fleet was said to have sunk 467 German ships, presumably in the course of the whole war. The battleship was not identified.

Seeking Oil Now Easier

Scientific Ears Can Hear 20,000 Feet Down; Removes Guesswork.

Deer—(AP)—Scientific ears that can hear 20,000 feet down the ground are taking the guesswork out of oil prospecting. 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Japanese Strategy

After having run their rapid course of conquest of the territories they most wanted, the Japanese made two huge and great new targets. Building Plan Seen Dropped

Not Likely That Buckland Property Will Be Developed Now.

It is doubtful if the option taken on land in Buckland owned by the state through its School Fund will be taken up and the plan to erect 80 low cost defense workers' houses carried out, as a result of the decision of the Zoning Commission last night in changing the zone from Rural to A, when a B zone was asked.

The property in question was held under an option taken by David Dunn of Hartford, who had expected to interest some large builder in the project. Plans for the houses to be erected had been drawn and were shown to the members of the Zoning Commission last night. The land faces on North Main street and extends through to Foland terrace, having a large frontage on North Main street. This is now zoned in the front on North Main street part, for B, but the rear part was zoned as Rural. The change last night asked that the entire section be zoned for B, which meant that houses could be erected on the land to contain not less than 6,000 square feet.

Frederick Made. Objection was raised by several residents in the section who stated that the houses might later be vacant and it would become a city of shanties. The opposition was led by George W. Ewing who lives at 640 North Main street across the road from where the building was to be carried out. A. W. Driggs, who owns property nearby, also opposed the plan.

There was also objection made to the plan of having septic tanks built on the land as it was claimed that the land would not take care of this kind of sewage. It was brought out that the local health department had taken tests of the land and had shown it to be unsuitable. Tests were also made by John V. Henderson of Hartford, a civil engineer, with opposite results.

Mr. Henderson took his tests in 11 different places by having holes dug in the ground, while the tests made by the local board of health consisted of plunging a crowbar in the ground, filling the hole with water and timing it while it dropped one inch.

After much debate, the Zoning Commission in executive session placed the land in A zone. This means that there will have to be 7,000 square feet allocated to be built in the rear.

It was also reported that a petition was to be sent to the Commission asking that the front part, now zoned as B, be changed to A and that such a change was likely to be made.

After hearing this report it was indicated that the option on the property would not be taken up and the houses would not be built.
