

Japs' Fleet Reeling Under Third Attack Of American Fliers

Pound Invasion Forces Off Aleutians; Cruiser Sunk; Aircraft Carrier, Destroyer, Gunboat and Transport Damaged; No Reports Of American Losses.

Washington, June 16.—(AP)—The Japanese Navy appeared today to be reeling under the third smashing attack it has suffered at the hands of the American Air Forces in as many operations along the Pacific. Following up the Coral sea and Midway island victories, in the southwestern and Middle Pacific areas, respectively, the Navy Department reported late yesterday that American fliers were pounding the Japanese invasion forces in the north, off the Aleutian islands.

While reports on the progress of the battle were inconclusive, Japanese losses listed this far included the sinking of one cruiser and the damaging of one aircraft carrier, at least three destroyers, one destroyer, one gunboat and one transport. Damage to some of the vessels was described as severe.

There were no reports of American losses.

In a communique breaking its three-day silence on what appears to have been a desperate attempt by the Japanese to gain a foothold on the barren, rocky island chain stretching away from Alaska, the Navy said attack operations were continuing by both Army and Navy fliers.

Except for these continuing air attacks upon the enemy landing parties and their supporting naval contingents," the communique said, "the general situation in the Aleutians is unchanged."

This was taken by some observers to mean that the enemy had failed to improve his position over the week-end by landing at any point other than Attu, a craggy little island that makes the westernmost tip of the Aleutian chain, 760 nautical miles from Dutch Harbor.

Attu, which is surrounded by treacherous reefs, and is almost constantly fogbound, was considered of little military value, although it might be used as a listening and reconnaissance base.

In addition to Attu, the enemy was reported last Friday to have sent a few ships into the little harbor at Kiska. Today authorities said they had been driven out.

While the latest engagement apparently has not yet been reported.

Night Torpedo Plane Attack Big Surprise

Invaders' Fleet Discovered by Navy's Long-Range Patrol Bombers—Rescues Thrilling.

Pearl Harbor, T. H., June 16.—(AP)—How the U. S. Navy's long-range patrol bombers discovered the Japanese fleet off Midway, a night torpedo attack against the invaders, and thrilling rescues of Navy fliers from rubber life boats were disclosed today in new accounts of the battle. Capt. Logan Ramsey of Philadelphia, commanding officer of the Army, Navy and Marine Corps land-based planes at Midway island, in unfolding further details of the battle said the night torpedo attack was the first time in history the planes had been so operated.

The crew of one patrol plane, forced down by fuel shortages, were eight days at sea, fighting off sharks which ripped at the rubber of their small life boats.

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Bill to Speed Guayule Plan Given Favor

Washington, June 16.—(AP)—The House Appropriations Committee approved today a \$53,648,000 measure to speed up the production of guayule rubber and for financing increased business and operating costs of the Post Office Department. \$38,688,000 because of what the committee said was an "unprecedented volume of mail and postal business."

Revenue for this fiscal year are \$50,000,000 more than expected, and expenditures are up \$22,000,000. The department, however, operates at a deficit.

The Budget Bureau asked Congress for \$9,750,000 for the rental, planting and cultivation of 60,000 acres of guayule, extension of nurseries to 500 acres for growing guayule seed and other plants, production of rubber and experimentation in processes of extracting rubber from the plants.

The committee reduces total to \$53,648,000 by cutting \$2,100,000 from the bill. Gas Rationing Spread Seen

Extension Outside Eastern Seaboard in Future Is Possibility.

Chicago, June 16.—(AP)—P. T. Hawkins of the OPA Post Rationing Branch, Washington, said today extension of gasoline rationing outside the eastern seaboard in the near future was "a very definite possibility."

Hawkins made the statement in an address prepared for delivery to the mid-year convention of the National Retail Dry Goods Association.

Not Purely Regional
"It is unfortunate that this emergency situation (gasoline rationing in the east) has inadvertently suggested to many that our automotive transportation program is purely a regional one," he said.

"Our transportation system must be regarded as a national asset, and it may be necessary at any time to divert transportation facilities now serving certain sections of the country to serve essential war needs in other areas."

"The most important consideration in plans for further gasoline restrictions, however, is the nation's critical rubber supply situation."

90 Per Cent on Autos
More than 90 per cent of the nation's rubber stockpile, Hawkins said, consists of tires for automobiles now in use. With unrestricted travel, almost 25,000,000 automobiles approximately 93 per cent of the nation's total passenger transportation facilities will have been retired from the highways by the end of 1944 because of tire exhaustion, he estimated.

"To date, gasoline rationing appears to be the most equitable and convenient means of controlling the use of automobiles," Hawkins said.

Hold Firmly to Positions
The German communique included one of the big battles like those with which the Kaiser's troops shelled Paris during the last world war, the dispatches said, but despite this weight of artillery the Red Army forces are holding firmly to their rearmost positions.

Navy to Defer Warship Plans

Decides to Concentrate On Expanding Fighting Power in Air.

Washington, June 16.—(AP)—An \$800,000,000 ship construction measure—an unprecedented program designed ultimately to double the size of the United States fleet—was approved today by the House Naval Committee. The measure, demonstrating the Navy's increasing emphasis on the plane carrier and pointedly neglecting new provisions for battleships, will provide for more than 1,400 ships of all types, including more than 400 combatant craft in the carrier class, destroyers and other types.

Washington, June 16.—(AP)—Two members of the Senate Naval Affairs Committee said today that Navy officials had decided to defer all plans for huge new battleships in order to concentrate upon expanding fighting power in the air.

Senator William D. (D., La.) and Brewster (R., Me.) in separate interviews said that top ranking admirals had informed them that no new battleships would be started until plans for cruisers now under way were being completed so that these would be converted as aircraft carriers.

"The Navy finally has decided it will have more airplanes to protect our present fleet," Brewster said. "Some of the cruisers being converted were pretty well along when I was here."

Italians Admit Loss Of Cruiser in Fight

Cairo, June 16.—(AP)—The United States Army Air Force and the R.A.F. operating together for the first time in the Mediterranean, have set fire to two Italian battleships, sunk a 10,000-ton Italian cruiser of the Trento class, and scored hits on a smaller cruiser and a destroyer in four days of heavy fighting, the R.A.F. announced today in a special communique. In addition, the R.A.F. and the Royal Navy's fleet air arm set fire to another Italian cruiser and probably hit destroyer in a second Italian naval force during the same period, the communique said.

An Army spokesman admitted that the gap between the invading column and another driving eastward through Benghazi had been reduced to 80 miles.

(The Japanese said their column was only 60 miles short.)

Chinese Seize Initiative
The communique said the Chinese had seized the initiative in the Nanchang region, some 400 miles south of the railway, and were storming the city, which the Japanese captured a few days ago. Heavy fighting was reported along the middle Yangtze river in Hupeh province, the communique said, with a Japanese column attacking to break the Chinese hold on Hanchuan river port where the Chinese were able to interfere with Japanese shipments upriver to Shensi and Ichang. The Japanese, driving down from Shanghai 25 miles to the north, entered Hanchuan but fierce fighting continued around the town.

Chungking, June 16.—(AP)—The Chinese high command announced tonight a further Japanese advance in east Kwang province, but indicated that the Chinese were exacting a heavy toll of Japanese columns striving to close pinches on the Chongking-Kiangsi railway.

A communique said the Chinese abandoned Kwangtung, 35 miles within Kiangsi, on Sunday after an all-night battle in which the Japanese, thrusting westward along the railway, suffered more than 1,000 casualties.

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Woman Held For Murder

Mrs. Pas Waives Examination in Death of New Britain Man.

New Britain, June 16.—(AP)—Pleading not guilty to a charge of murder and waiving examination, Mrs. Eva Pas, of 243 High street, New Britain, today appeared before Superior Court without bond by Judge Elias T. Ringrose in police court today after he was informed she was accused of causing the death of Stanley Borgula, 48, of 7 Noble street by sending him a bottle of poisoned whiskey.

Borgula died yesterday morning after taking a drink from the bottle which he received Saturday afternoon by special delivery parcel post. Lieut. Michael J. Flynn, chief of police, said that Mrs. Pas, as a person who mailed a package to Borgula Saturday morning.

When Mrs. Pas was told the court she said "I'm not guilty and will waive examination. Judge Ringrose ordered that Mrs. Pas be held in lieu of \$10,000 bail next day.

Reporters
Lieutenant Flynn and Sgt. Daniel J. Czaprowski said today Mrs. Pas confessed last night to the murder. Borgula boarded at her home before his marriage six months ago, and the police said the confession revealed she sent him the whiskey in a spirit of jealousy and revenge. Mrs. Pas said she bought the whiskey Friday night, poured a quantity of cyanide fluid into the bottle and mailed it to Borgula, a factory worker, next day.

After an autopsy yesterday, medical Examiner Clifton M. Crowley said, "There was enough poison in that drink to kill a good many men."

Mrs. Pas is the mother of five sons and daughters ranging in age from 28 to 21. Police say they received for month, \$1,897,646.00.

Income Limit Plan Dodged

Ways and Means Committee Considers Request.

Washington, June 16.—(AP)—Chairman Doughton (D., N. C.), said today the House Ways and Means Committee had decided not to take the responsibility now of considering the administration's request for a \$25,000 limitation on individual incomes after payment of taxes.

The members said that they understood that the request probably would not be considered in connection with the pending tax bill. Word spread on Capitol Hill today that "there is no feeling on action expedited on excise taxes."

Suggests Two Parts
Mr. Roosevelt was reported to have suggested that the pending tax bill be divided into two parts, with all efforts being directed toward the first part, the excise tax on excise levies that would produce at least \$1,000,000 a day.

Priority Carried Deficit

63 in Lottery Ring Indicted

Residents of Three Nations Held for Conspiracy by Federal Jury

Detroit, June 16.—(AP)—U. S. District Attorney J. C. Laffrindis today said that 63 residents of the United States, Cuba and Panama had been indicted as conspirators in an international lottery operation described by postal authorities as one of the largest and most extensive in the United States.

A federal grand jury returned the indictment (June 1) based on the operations of the Republic of Cuba, Inc., for the lottery. Later said District Judge Ernest A. O'Brien had ordered it suppressed to facilitate the arrest of the defendants, which was scheduled for today.

Arrest of Mail Fraud
A companion indictment accused 14 persons of mail fraud, filed in connection with the Cuban lottery.

Postal Inspector Ernest J. Mangels of Jacksonville, Fla., who conducts the lottery, said it was the first time in the history of the ring's operations, described the lottery, which originated in Havana, Cuba, as itself a fraud. Mangels said tickets were sold with the representation that \$500,000 would be paid in prizes, whereas in fact only \$32,250 was distributed to winners.

Laffrindis said the syndicate "combined efficient means and racketeering methods in the nationwide operation of lotteries, based on a double and treble fraud." He said the provided printing shops for the manufacture of lottery tickets and

Board Grants Wage Increase

Employees of Garbage Collection Dept. to Get More Per Hour.

The Board of Selectmen granted the request of the employees of the Garbage Collection department of the town for a 10 cent an hour increase in pay at the monthly meeting held last night, bringing the pay of the thirteen men in the department from 85 cents an hour to 75 effective at once.

The town has had difficulty in securing and keeping employees in the department due to higher wages paid in defense industries. The new increase was \$65 a year. The Selectmen denied the request of the owner of an amusement arcade, for permission to operate his place of business after 2 o'clock on Sunday afternoon and at the same time clamped down on the operating hours of two local bowling alleys on Sunday. It was stated by members of the board that the local bowling alleys have been operating on Sunday afternoon for many years.

Petitions for authorization of bowling on Sunday afternoon were submitted by Fred Murphy and Joseph Farr who operate alleys on Main street and Oak street.

Lesener's Argument Attorney George C. Lesener, who appeared for Irving H. Halprin, owner of the amusement arcade located in the Halprin block, said that there should be no distinction shown with respect to the three places of business featuring "games of skill" and stated that many of the devices found in the amusement places were to be found in the bowling alleys.

Attorney Lesener pointed out that it was essential that all such places of amusement should be strictly supervised and the police should see that minors should be kept out of them. He said that there should be no discrimination and that if one such place should be required to close, all should come under the same restrictions.

The owners of these places should be made to understand, he said, that they operate under penalty of losing their licenses if they permit minors to frequent their establishments.

Another Group Off for Exams

Local Delegation of 95 Report at Hartford; Get 14 Days' Stay.

A delegation of 95 registrants left Selective Service headquarters at 8:30 this morning to report at the U. S. Army induction center in Hartford for the army physical examination. Those who pass the examination will be inducted into the army and then in two weeks will be sent to the reception center at Fort Devens, Mass.

This morning's delegation was part of this town's June quota of 117 registrants. The local board in the 117 quota, the balance of 22 registrants being represented by enlistments in other branches of the service prior to induction notice. This district gets credit for enlistments that become effective after classification.

Practically all of the 95 men left for army examination this morning will return to town this afternoon or evening under a new regulation that became effective yesterday.
