12,000 Acre Tract Fans Out from Iowa Village Over Bottomlands Of Rivers.

Wapello, Ia., July 2.—(Wide World)—Mass production has hit world)—mass production has not the corn belt.

What is probably the largest sorn-hog operation under one management in the nation—a 12,000-acre tract of Mississippi and Iowa river bottomlands—fans out from this southeastern Iowa village.

-Will Be Sought

Washington, July 2—(P) — The death penalty will be sought when eight men go on trial before a special commission next week charged with rowing ashore from German submarines for the purpose of blowing up American military installations.

As tentatively developed during a series of conferences between War and Justice Department officials, plans for the trial of the alleged suboteurs rounded up by the FBI after they landed in Florids and on Long Island called for appointment by President Roosevelt of a seven-member military commission to pass judgment.

The trial will be closed and will be held in Washington or at one of the nearby government reservations. The defendants will have counsel.

While there are few precedents to guide the procedure, it was expected that trial would follow the general pattern on a court martial.

A three-man panel, not board members, submitted a fact-finding report which supported a wage in-crease but did not actually recom-

crease would violate the national wage stabilization program because the companies wages are not substandard nor below the level of health and decency; the fact that men in some other industries working many hours of overtime are receiving larger net wages is not proper ground for raising basic rates in steel.

Republic also argued the proposed wage increase was not justified on the ground of rising living costs. Patton said that from August, 1939, to March, 1942, steel weekly wages increased 23.7 per cent and living costs rose only 13.7 per cent.

John C. Gall, appearing for Toungstown Sheet and Tube Company, said in a prepared brief: The question of ability to pay a demanded wage increase (as reported by the panel) is relevant in a negative sense only. Obviously an employer who cannot meet an increase should not be ordered to do so. But to say that the fustness of a proposed wage increase is to be tested by the ability of the employer to pay it, is to ignore the true criteria. If that is a sound basis on which to predicate a wage increase for steel workers, why is it not a sound basis in all other fields of endeavor?

Not Valid Basis

"Why should not office workers, chauffeurs, domestic servants, and all other classes of employes be entitled as a matter of right to wage increases because their employers are able, at the moment, to pay them? And if ability to pay is a valid basis, why should not the employer who is better able to pay than his competitor pay a higher wage, notwithstanding their employes may be doing exactly the same kind and amount of work?

"To ask these questions seems to us to suppress the answer name."


