

British Army Trying To Exploit Success Of Counter-Stroke

Battle of Egypt Is Rejoined with Unrelenting Fury West of El Alamein; German and Italian Units Forced To Retreat After General Assault Less Than 70 Miles from Goal.

Cairo, July 3.—(AP)—The Battle of Egypt was rejoined with unrelenting fury today west of El Alamein in the bottleneck of the coastal approach to the Nile valley, with the resurgent British Eighth Army striving to exploit its first successful counter-stroke since the Axis invasion started.

Yesterday the British now being considerably reinforced, struck at the flank of the Axis drive on El Alamein, and with nightfall the R. A. F., buttressed by the South African Air Force and the United States Army Air Force, struck out anew at the enemy's immediate rear as well as vital ports for supplies and reinforcements.

Planes Bombed Tobruk American planes, manned by American crews, took part in one of the heaviest bombardments of Tobruk, Libyan port. Throughout yesterday's battle fighting planes and dive-bombers shuttled over the land forces, providing invaluable backing for the defenders and attacking Rommel's concentrations. It could be assumed that this offensive continued today.

'Auto Use' Tax Sales Seen Poor

Top Treasury Officials Go into Huddle Over Proposed Methods Of Enforcing Levy.

Washington, July 3.—(AP)—Indications that large numbers of automobile owners were staying away from the \$5 Federal use tax stamp window sent top treasury officials into a huddle today over various proposed methods of enforcing the levy.

The first auto stickers, which have been required since Feb. 1, expired Tuesday night, but scattered reports indicate "exceptionally poor" sales of the new stamps covering the fiscal year starting July 1. On a proportionate basis, the first stickers cost \$2.09.

Technically, persons who do not show the stamps on their windshields are liable to fine or jail term.

Rosters Will Act as Guide On Deferrals

Essential Civilian Activities and 'Critical War Occupations' to Be Published July 15.

Washington, July 3.—(AP)—War manpower sources said today that rosters of essential civilian activities and "critical war occupations" would be published about July 15 to establish a definite guide for military deferment.

The United States Employment Service is preparing the lists in collaboration with the War Production Board, the War, Navy and Agriculture Departments, and with other government agencies, as a part of the general program to keep men with critical skills at their work benches following the capture of Tobruk June 21.

Copies to Draft Boards By direction of Manpower Chairman Paul V. McNutt, copies of the lists will be sent to all local Draft Boards, and to the extent required to the maintenance of essential activities, individuals who are engaged in essential occupations in essential activities will be deferred from military service.

'Flying Tigers' End Volunteer Days in China

Daredevil Corps Joins Wings Tomorrow with Regular United States Air Force in Nation.

Chungking, July 3.—(AP)—The epic story of the "Flying Tigers," a thrilling tale of achievement by a handful of brave men against overwhelming odds, ended today with the dissolution of the American Volunteer Group.

Its sequel, with the promise of more and worse headaches for the Japanese, begins tomorrow with the daredevil corps joins wings with the regular United States Army Air Force in China.

Accomplishments Reviewed The final chapter in the unique story of the volunteer fliers, one of the most sensational of the whole war, was a singularly humane document issued today which reviewed their accomplishments, their honors, their grief and their tribulations.

Only at the end did the official history hint of the Flying Tigers' sacrifices in offering their services in a country against a powerful foe.

Destroy 284 Jap Planes From the time the A. V. G. first went into battle on Dec. 20, 1941—less than seven months ago—the announcement said its fliers shot down or burned on the ground 284 Japanese planes definitely, probably destroyed almost a many more and "was responsible for what is believed to be the demoralization of the Japanese Air Force in China."

Two buildings received direct hits and several fires were started, the war bulletin said. General MacArthur's communique yesterday also had announced an attack on Dili, which lies 500 miles across the Timor Sea from Darwin.

Bremen Hit Again By British Fliers; 13 Bombers Lost

Many Fires Left Burning; Canadian Pilot Report 'Most Satisfying' of Recent Raids; Bombers Attack Vessels Off Dutch Coast.

London, July 3.—(AP)—The Air Ministry announced today that Bremen, German port attacked for three times in a week, was blasted overnight again by a powerful force of R. A. F. bombers.

Thirteen raiders failed to return. "The weather was good and many fires were left burning," the Air Ministry said. "One enemy fighter was destroyed."

Canadian Joins in Attack Scores of Canadian pilots joined the British bombardiers in the attack on Bremen and said it was the "most satisfying" of recent raids.

Fires were burning so fiercely when they reached the target that "it was like aiming at a patchwork quilt," they said.

Canadian gunners were reported to have shot down at least one of the German night fighters whose numbers were said to have been higher than during any previous raids.

Judge Ponders Treason Trial Penalty Today

Stephan Convicted on Second Ballot of Jury; Punishment Can Be Death of Offender.

Detroit, July 3.—(AP)—German-born Max Stephan sat in a prison cell today convicted of the highest crime in the land—treason—while Federal Judge Arthur J. Tuttle pondered the punishment, which could be execution.

Judge Tuttle had promised sentence "very shortly" after a jury yesterday finished one hour and 23 minutes of deliberation with the declaration, "We find the defendant guilty as charged," to a courtroom packed and silent.

Stephan, a naturalized citizen who was accused of 12 overt acts of assistance to a fleeing German war prisoner, met the verdict with the same cold expression which he had adopted on his first entrance to the courtroom three days previously.

New York, July 3.—(AP)—It's razor blades and jigsaw instead of rifles and hand grenades for a little band of high school lads who are playing no minor part in America's war effort.

With these seemingly inappropriate tools, they're fashioning scale models of every nation's warplanes for the Navy's use in building up an Axis-smashing air fleet.

Give Up Summer Vacations And they're giving up their summer vacations to meet a quota of 175,000 of the miniature craft which are helping Naval personnel brush up quickly on the all-important subject of aircraft identification.

Vacation time was two days old when a visitor to Haaren high school's aviation trades annex found two dozen of the volunteer model-makers working away on tiny Messerschmitts and zero fighters.

They insisted that the challenge presented by the complicated work of making each model perfect in detail and the knowledge they were helping their country at war more than made up for missing out on visits to the old swimming hole.

More Fun on Rainy Days "On a rainy day like this," explained another youngster, "it's really fun to build a model of a Stuka dive-bomber. This is more fun than anything. If the sun's out—well, it's still fun."

Besides, the boys pointed out, they're not alone in foregoing their vacation—teacher is, too.

For in another room at the same high school, and in other schoolrooms throughout the city, manual training instructors also are busy building plane models for use in pre-flight aviation courses which will be a part of the curriculum of all city schools when they open this fall.

Reds and Nazis Fight Largest Tank Battle; Germans Claim Gains

Break Through Russian Front on Width of Nearly 300 Kilometers—German and Italian Troops Repel 'Several Local Attacks' by Soviet in South; 50,000 Prisoners Captured.

Berlin (From German Broadcasts), July 3.—(AP)—German and other Axis troops have broken through the Russian front on a width of nearly 300 kilometers (about 185 miles), the German high command announced today. (The communiqué did not locate the section of the front involved. In reporting new German offensives at Belograd and Volchansk and a mammoth battle of tanks in progress at Kurak, Russian dispatches referred to the line from Kurak to Kupyansk. This front, about 150 miles long by air but longer by land, may be the area in which the German communiqué claims a break-through.)

Suffer Severe Losses The communiqué said that German and Italian troops in the south repelled "several local attacks" by the Red Army and that Red Army tank brigades had counter-attacked on the 300-kilometer front, only to suffer severe losses.

Of the fighting in the Sevastopol region of the Crimea the communiqué said that 50,000 prisoners had been taken at Sevastopol and that 21 tanks, 508 field guns, 652 anti-aircraft guns and other material had been captured or destroyed.

German military dispatches said the Russians on Kherones peninsula had been encircled and "again made desperate counter-attacks in an effort to break through but were repulsed with heavy losses."

The German Air Force participating in this fighting and heavy caliber bombs exploded in columns consisting of motorized and horse-drawn vehicles, indicating the most severe casualties," it was added. "A hastily constructed field position and many houses, turned into pillboxes, were smashed to pieces by direct hits by heavy bombs."

German pursuit planes made numerous low altitude attacks, inflicting additional human and material losses.

"Simultaneously, the mopping-up of the Sevastopol city district is being systematically continued. Enemy hiding places in cellars, subterranean passages and deep crevices in the rocks were searched and combed of scattered Bolsheviks and weapons."

Army Will Use Deferred Men To Start Induction of Regular Quotas of I-B Class on August 1.

Washington, July 3.—(AP)—The Army announced intention today of starting the induction of regular quotas of men placed in the deferred I-B Selective Service class because of minor physical defects.

Beginning Aug. 1, men with only one eye or complete deafness in one ear, among others, will be inducted for limited military service, provided they otherwise meet requirements.

They will be assigned to duty with corps area service commands and the War Department overhead organization, and thereby release an almost equal number of fully qualified soldiers for service with task forces.

Safe and Sane Holiday Looms For This Year

Most War Factories to Continue Work; Fireworks Abandoned and Fewer on Highways.

By The Associated Press A nation fighting to protect the freedom it won in other wars celebrates tomorrow its first wartime Fourth of July in a quarter-century under conditions that may make it really "safe and sane."

Most war factories will hum on, many fireworks have been abandoned and, on the populous eastern seaboard, gasoline rationing will keep the greater part of the area's 10,000,000 motorists off the highways.

Tris, many of the 54,000,000 residents of the 17 gas-starved Atlantic coast states plan to make their usual holiday trips by train or bus, and some municipalities, mostly in the Midwest, are to stage huge fireworks displays, but travel generally will be in the form of parades and fireworks in the form of speeches.

Army warnings that fireworks displays and large gatherings might present opportunities for token air raids and for saboteurs and actual bans on such celebrations on the east and west coasts as well as the Gulf states indicated that those areas would observe the holiday quietly.

In the nation's capital, Washington's annual municipal fireworks display was cancelled and it was announced that work would go on in all government offices connected with the war effort.

Big Events Fanned Inland, however, in some central and southwestern states, where the danger of possible air raids is less than that on the coasts, many big events were planned to attract great throngs of celebrants, unhampered by gas rationing.

Typical of these will be Minneapolis' annual American Legion show at Powderhorn Park, where 200,000, the largest crowd in the event's 15-year history, are expected to attend an all-day program featuring the mass induction of 1,500 Navy recruits.

A civilian defense program including demonstrations on how to extinguish incendiary bombs and a big fireworks display at night also will be presented in the park.

Hundreds of Machines Engaged on Each Side East of Kurak; Nazi Shock Troops Try To Outflank and Separate Russian Central and Southern Armies

75 to 100 Miles South

Moscow, July 3.—(AP)—The greatest tank battle of the current German offensive with hundreds of machines engaged on both sides, is in progress east of Kurak within 75 and 100 miles to the south.

Nazi Shock troops are attempting to outflank and separate the Russian central and southern armies, Soviet military dispatches reported today. The battle on the Kurak front began Wednesday morning with an attack by about 200 German tanks.

Mass Engagement at Noon These were hurled back, and then the real mass engagement began at noon that day.

The Germans suffered tremendous losses, and in the thick of battle the Red Army was engaged to increase the fortification of its already-strong positions at Red Star, the Army newspaper said.

Few details were given, but the Russians were said to have recaptured several villages.

Kurak, a key front in the present conflict, is about 250 miles south of Moscow and 125 miles north of Khar'kov.

To the south, the new German thrusts were in the Belgorod and Volchansk sectors, 50 and 35 miles north and northeast of Khar'kov. At these points, roughly midway in the battleline from Kurak to Kupyansk, the Germans were admitted to hold numerical superiority. Before Volchansk the Germans were acknowledged to have broken through temporarily at several points with small groups of tanks.

No Real Gains Made Red Star said they had made no real gains, however, being outflanked by the Germans.
