The thing which is missing in this battle against inflation, of course, is the awareness of both labor and the farm bloc that it is their own welfare which is involved, that it is for their own good that some limit should be set on their profits from this war.

Instead of resigning this, instead of playing their own part toward the establishment of some limit, they seem fascinated and swept away by some vision of sweet and endless special profits for themselves. If they persist in following that vision, if the nation runs for office in order to get laws which is a ghastly miscarriage of its intent.

Any number of political leaders are, these nights, climbing to high posts to take their patriotic turn for the aircraft warning service, and it was just their love of high places which made the Crow's Nest at the Capitol such a favorite spot a few years ago?

Strangely enough, you are likely to shy away from the full implications of your own importance, and let it stay as some vague condition to your life. It may seem to you that some one else, or the nation as a whole, has done all that has been necessary about preserving and exercising your importance.

You're quite willing to let it go on that way, keeping your freedom and your importance as if it were something that you can bank, which is less effort and sometimes more pleasant than exercising your own permanent stewardship over them. If you had a million dollars you wouldn't carry it around with you, ready to defend it every moment of the day and night. What you have as an individual in the way of life for which you are fighting is perhaps worth more than a million dollars. But at any rate, whether you fully appreciate it or not, you don't want to be bothered having to carry it around with you.

That may be the chief reason why you've never actually taken a good look at it to see just what it is, its importance of the individual which we are defending.

But, if you can get over your fear of it and your distaste for the responsibility that a true knowledge of your own importance is bound to carry, there are a few things you should realize.

You, the individual, are this country. You see what life is like in your country. You decide what this country does. You are deciding whether this war shall be won or lost. You are the most powerful and important individual in the world, you, as an ordinary American citizen. Don't go through this war without understanding that President has the power, or that Congress has it, or that even the generals have it. If they are selected then you will select them.

If they are the wrong ones, you are responsible. If they are responsible, what you think, what you say in your most casual conversation, are binding influences upon the course and policy and success and failure of this nation.

That is the importance of the individual which the democratic way of life is defending.

Perhaps you'll better take a good look at it, accepting it all for yourself. For if you don't, if you abdicate from it before you have examined it, some one else who wouldn't use your power and authority just the way you would be going to come along and wield it by your default. You might as well face the fact: you are living in an era where your privilege and power and responsibility as an individual are safe in any hands any longer. You have to assume the risk of protecting them yourself; you can't win this war by defaulting.

Did the wrong thing; it is all from this time in, a question of what you yourself do. It is you—and you alone—specifically you—who is meant every time anyone talks about the place of the individual in a democracy. Either you take it, or you become a ruler stamp in Hitler's kind of world. The pleasantest way of the accomplishment of your responsibilities is over.

It's time for you to be an American on your own account. It's your turn now.

Comment From the River Road

Mr. Mollan, retired editor of The Herald, preserves his contact with his former daily readers by writing a weekly letter for these columns in which he expresses his own leisurely arrived-at convictions concerning some major matters and his observations as seen from the banks of the Atlantic River. Look for his contribution each week-end.

During the many years of my Stephen Decatur and his little squadron bottled up in New London. Also this man and his Federalist friends kept a close watch on Decatur, and every time the American commodore attempted to slip out of the harbor and put to sea they warned the commodore of the blockading British fleet by burning buoys. I believe some of this man's descriptions are still living in this vicinity, still occupying a highly superior plane to that of their more American neighbors.

Connecticut, one recalls with little pride, had more than its share of the early days of the American Revolution. It was one of the early days—almost as many as that of New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania or New Jersey. They did not in the least believe in democracy; quite the contrary. And perhaps it is natural that among us are still a considerable number of their descendants who, though they may and do give lip service to the democratic way of life, are still in the habit of fighting to preserve, secretly do not believe in it at all. Not any more than does Hitler or Laval.

They are desperately afraid when Hitler and Fascism are beaten they will have to live in a new kind of world, one in which to the dignity and rights of the common man must be respected—and the prospect has them worried and bewildered. They are afraid of Hitler and the Nazis, but these mad dogs will be destroyed. But they are almost as much afraid that they will not be able to maintain that special position of superiority to the common herd which they feel is now theirs.

They are, indeed, between the devil and the deep sea. They do not want Hitler and the Nazis to win the war because they are afraid of them, so they give it a grudging, half-hearted support. They certainly do not want to have any such kind of peace as is called for by the Atlantic charter. They cannot abide the thought of the dawn of real democracy in the world, such as things like Roosevelt and Churchill because they have made such a thing the issue. So, in their dilemma they carp and criticize and sneer and invent lies in which they have no trouble in believing themselves. And they keep up their Tory and Federalist family traditions in so doing. They have thousands of likepelted followers.

Should Take Warning

Now perhaps it would be a good thing for such people to remember that many things happened to the British in the Revolutionary War, that were decidedly unpleasant. At first, because they were unorganized and unprepared, they were defeated and many were killed. But they were not so much interfered with. They were dragged on and their issue became more doubtful, the temper of the patriotic majority became more amiable and the Tories began to have a tough time. They complained practically all the wealthy financial class and big merchants, all the colonial office holders, a lot of the professional men, and a lot of copy-cats and hangers-on. But they were probably outnumbered by the revolutionaries. The Board of Information announced.

I have never believed that many of the Revolutionary Tories or their Federalist descendants with their loyalty to the British crown. Instead they were animated far more by fear of real democracy and the possibility of loss of their positions of superiority and special privilege. Anyhow the Tories flocked together pretty well, toward the end of the war, the British garrisons. Mean time the patriots were passing conviction laws and seizing their properties, condemning them to banishment, under penalty of death and making things decidedly uncomfortable for them. And when the smash came in 1781, they and the British forces began to evacuate the country, a great many of the Tories hastened to get out of the new republic. Washington In Wartime

Washington—If there isn't an old Chinese proverb to the effect that there are two sides to every question, there should be. And there is. It is a very old one: When both sides seem to be right, the fault lies with the truth.

The case in hand is the anti-inflation ruckus and no matter if Congress gives the Office of Price Administration all it asked for, something around \$100,000,000, it is still off without a penny. It's a question you haven't even begun to hear the last of.

The facts are really quite simple. Most economists hereabouts, most government officials, and most Congressmen are agreed that outside of losing the war, inflation is the greatest threat to the United States today, tomorrow and ten or twenty years hence.

Some economists and some Congressmen have stated publicly that this war and the peace that is to come can be won or lost by the American home front, depending respectively upon whether we control the cost of living now or afterwards.

With this in mind, the do-nothing attitude of the House of Representatives is a disgrace. It involved price increases with ratio lag when necessary and possibly later, anti-inflationary program. It involved forced savings and heavy taxation.

Even before the law was enacted came the revolt of the farm and labor bloc. They know the squabble and name-calling hasn't so much as tagged our anti-inflation drive by destroying public confidence in its execution.

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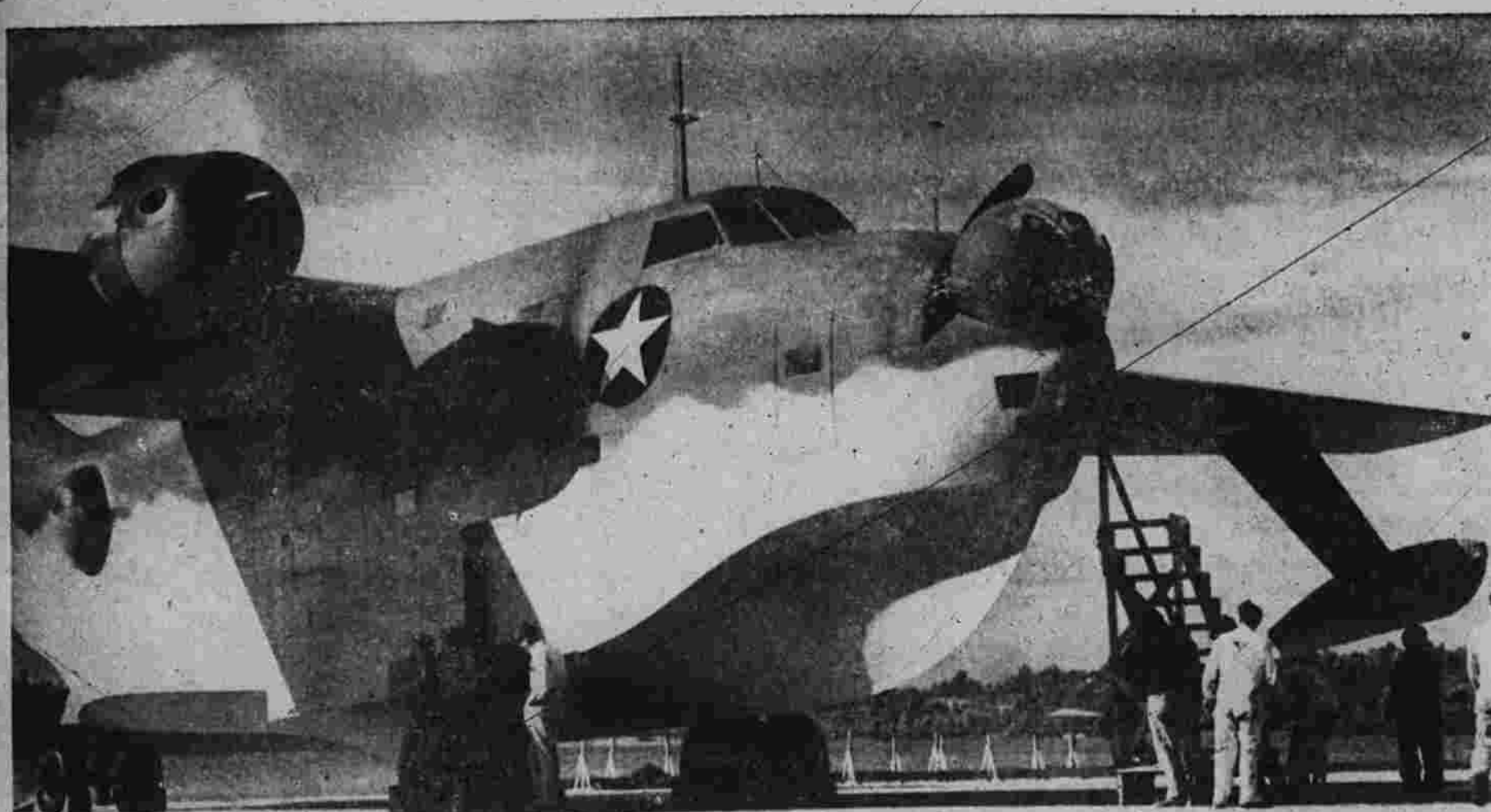

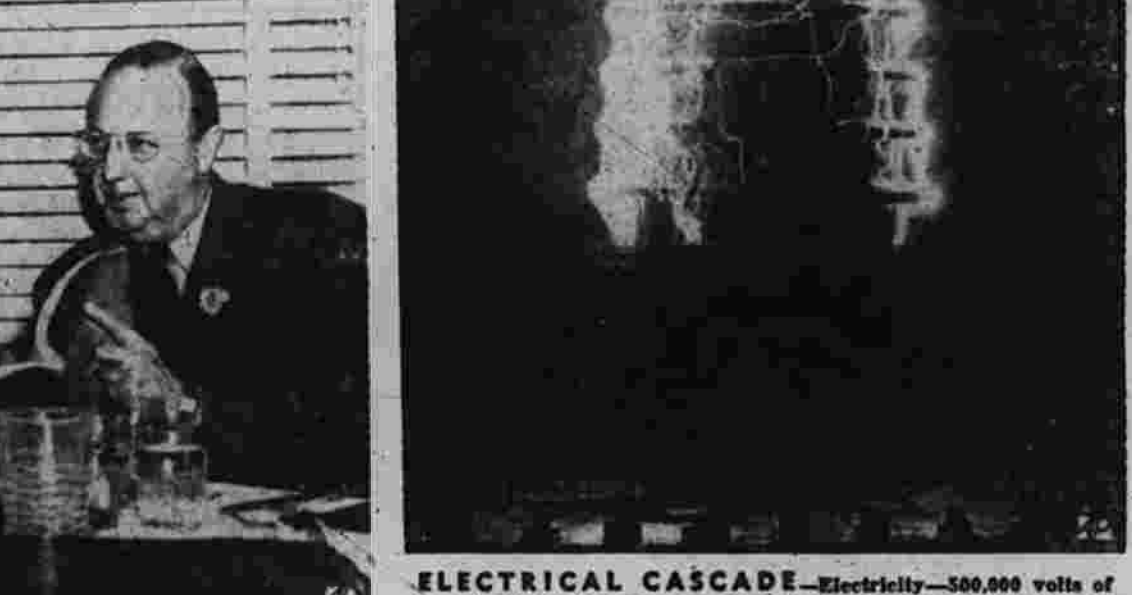

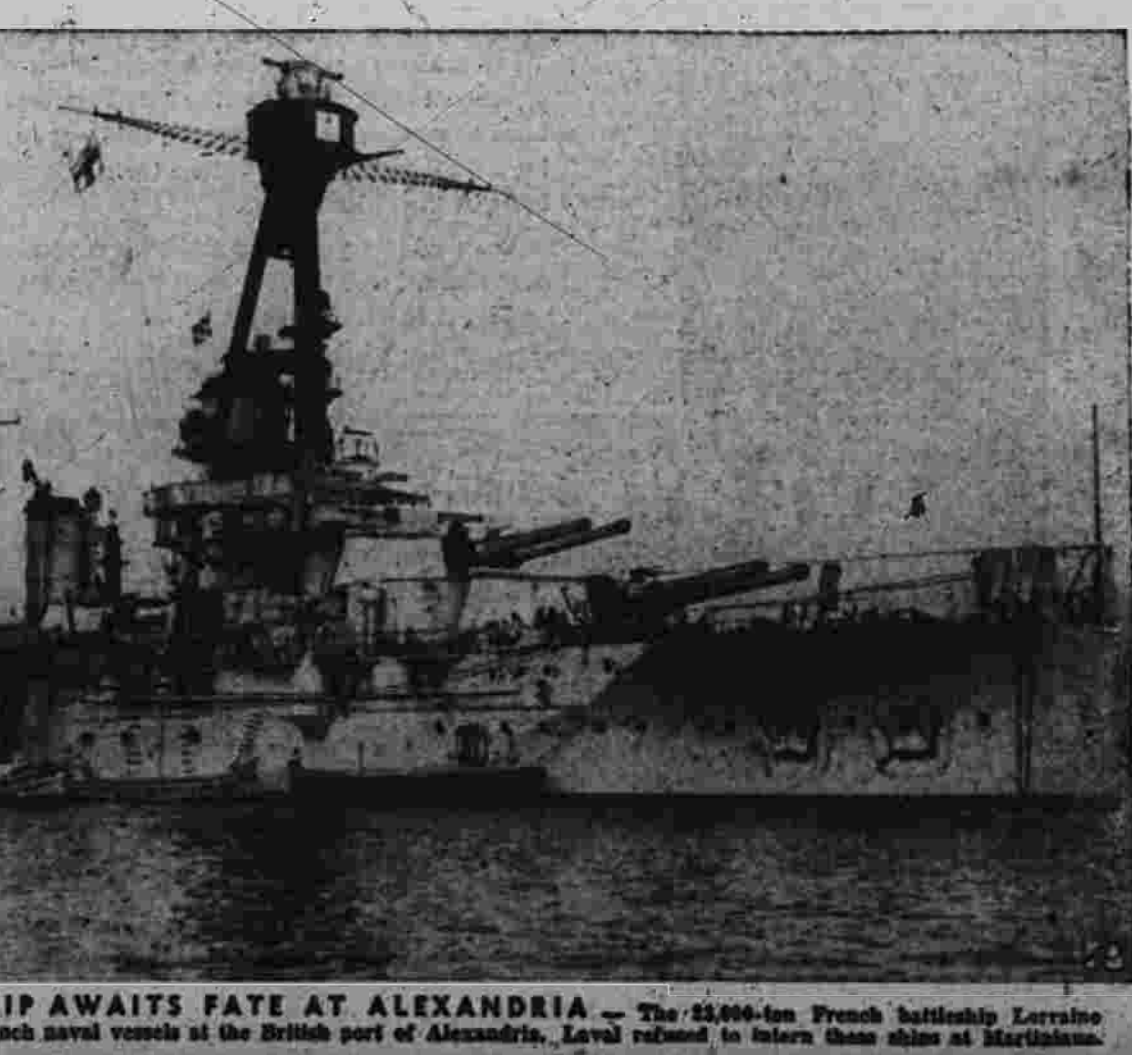
