Ground operations yesterday again were limited to minor skirmishes and desultory artillery fire, headquarters said.

A British commando said that United States heavy bombers had gone into action with the B. 24's again Saturday night, carrying out successful attacks on Tobruk, and Crete—from which the Axis forces have been repulsed following supplies.

There was comparatively little enemy air activity over the weekend. Axis airmen did not take advantage of British bombers yesterday night to carry out their usual attacks on British bases and airposts.

Bombers Report Successful Raids

With a United States Bomber Group somewhere in Egypt, July 26—Delayed—U. S. bombers were the first of a task force of American bombers to report highly successful raids over enemy territory last night.

Ten bombers, manned by several Americans carried out the mission, and every man and machine returned.

Usually this section of the North End is extremely busy all day from early morning until after six in the evening.

Rome (From Italian Broadcasts) July 27.—The Italian high command reported today that British forces had repulsed a new British attack on the southern sector of the El Alamein front and captured a number of prisoners.

The Italians acknowledged that British planes caused some damage and casualties on the Axis front.
