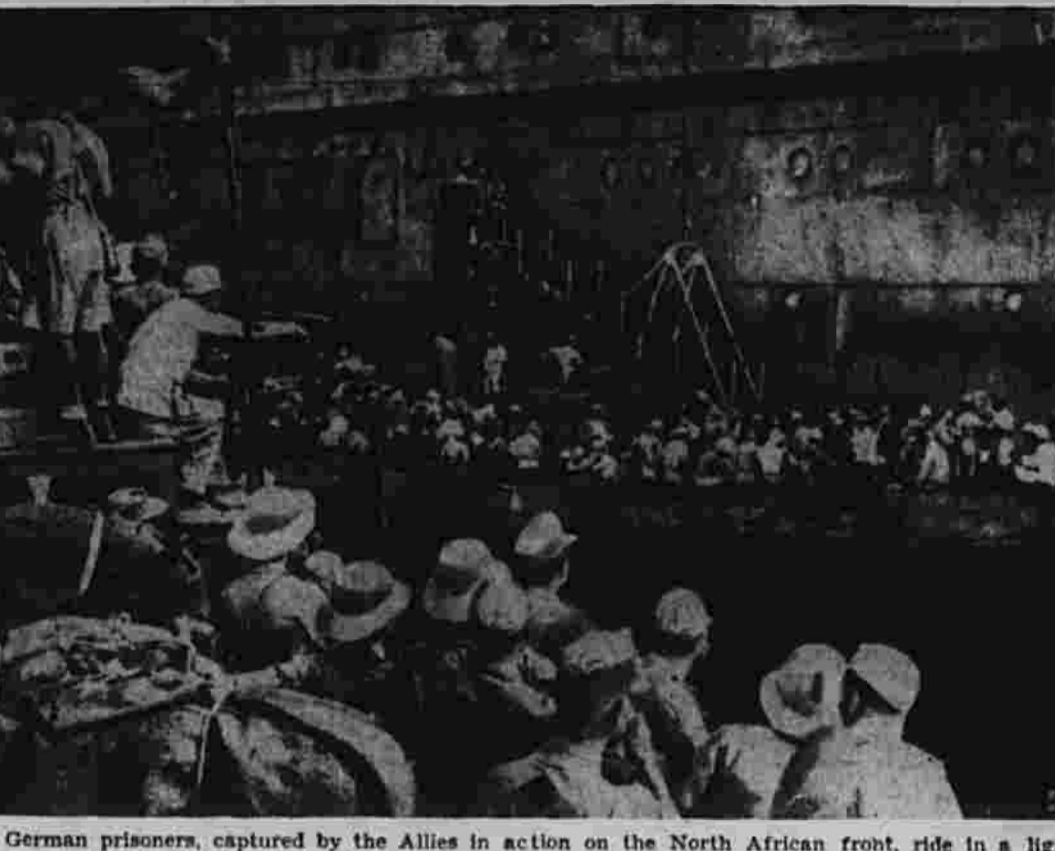

New York—Bob Russell likes being a war refugee from opera. It seems that you meet any interesting person, the same like a 300-year-old man, a man who is a looker, or at the very least, magazine stories. He thinks that the job of being an actor and the handsome six-footer with a handsome nose and fine features nose is one of the best in town—is a fine springboard for a career.

As it is, he considers himself a specialist in a specialized field in which topnotchers earn all the way from \$150 to \$500 a week. At the Hotel New Yorker, where he presides over the ice show and doubles as emcee, his contract has been renewed four times.

A Real Showman  
A master of the singing, he is a contemplative of masters of ceremony, who crack smutty jokes, demand applause, and permit themselves to be heckled.

As a good emcee, he says, "I'll rise above his designation and become an entertainer himself. He should be master of the situation and avoid embarrassment for the establishment and himself."

He dug out everything in the trunk, from impersonations to comedy. Last year he called him back. This year he is producing the pageant.

Drawbacks to being an emcee are few, Bob thinks. "Some acts consider the emcee a stooge and resent any variety in his work," he says. "I don't think a good operator will work harmony by giving the acts impersonations and letting the performers succeed on their merits.
