Urges Return Of Strikers

Davis Tells Workers Illness Jeopardizing Lives of Thousands

Alton, Ill., Sept. 11.—(AP)—Telling workers at the high Western Cartridge plant their illness jeopardized the lives of thousands of American soldiers and sailors, William H. Davis, out-going chairman of the War Labor Board, called on the strikers today to return to work immediately.

Davis telegraphed his warning from Washington to Fred Olds, American Federation of Labor organizer, operations at the huge plant were so limited "as to be of no value at all" a company spokesman said.

The strike began Tuesday over discharge of an employee in the munitions powder division and spread to the entire plant yesterday. Twelve companies of the state militia were mobilized to prevent possible disorders.

Companies held in Armories. All companies were held in their home armories while Illinois state police, county officials and plant guards maintained a close watch. There was no trouble and the picket line was small.

The employe over whom the strike was called is Francis Bunz, president of the local union of the AFL Chemical Workers, the company, suspended him for alleged entry into a restricted area of the munitions works without permission and declined to restore him to the job pending a hearing before a disciplinary board.

Davis telegraphed that he had understood the workers were striking because he believed that the company improperly refused to retire a fellow worker who had been suspended.

Jeopardizing Strikers' Lives. "Although you may believe you are helping your fellow worker, you must also recognize that by this strike you are jeopardizing the lives of thousands of soldiers and sailors fighting the war on far-flung fronts. I therefore call on you to return to work immediately."

Standard Book For Air Raids

State Defense Council Issues Manual to All Wardens in State.

Hartford, Sept. 11.—The State Defense Council has prepared for distribution a new standardized report form for air raid wardens. With it are also distributing a manual which explains the procedure wardens should follow in sending reports of air raid damage. These forms and manuals will be distributed to all wardens in the local warden organizations throughout the state.

Commenting on this plan, Colonel Samuel H. Fisher, Administrator, said today: "Wardens have shown the need for more training and practice in the reporting of air raid damage. This new manual will be distributed to all wardens in the state and will be used for the most complicated reports as well as the simple ones. It will be distributed gratis to each warden in Connecticut."

The manual was prepared by Major Hugo Boss, supervisor of air raid wardens. It is a 16-page report form, the motor corps; and James H. Osborn, director of ARP training. In addition to a detailed explanation, it includes a list of questions and directions to cover unusual situations. Connecticut is the first state to prepare such a manual. It has been reviewed with considerable interest by other states. One copy is being placed in the hands of each warden in Connecticut and it is to be considered part of his equipment.

Remington Co. Sues Collector

New Haven, Sept. 11.—(AP)—Seeking to recover from the United States government \$1,618.18 in excise taxes paid during a three-year period, the Remington Army Company today sued today named Thomas S. Hope to Meet Deadline Date

Leaders Set Stage for Considering Inflation Curb Plans Quickly.

Washington, Sept. 11.—(AP)—Administration leaders set the stage today for prompt congressional consideration of President Roosevelt's demands for legislation curbing rising wages, farm prices and profits.

Amendments to the existing price control act still were in the drafting stage but leaders expressed hope of meeting the October 1 deadline—the date when the president said he would take the necessary action himself if Congress fails to do so.

Final Three-Day Hearings. Senator Brown (D-Mich.) already has set his goal three days ago for meeting the deadline. He is planning to introduce the Senate Banking Committee bill for action late next week.

Chairman of a subcommittee, Brown picked the original price control bill through the Senate. He will sponsor the amendments which will be introduced by Chairman Wagner (D-N.Y.) of the full committee.

Republican Chairman Wagner, who is in charge of the bill, said he expects the House will have some representative opposing any hearings at all.

Before the Senate recessed for the week-end, Stevens obtained unanimous consent yesterday to introduce the bill in time to begin hearings Monday. Chairman Steagall (D-Ala.) of the House said he expects to introduce the bill in the House next week.

Senator Norris (Ind-Neb) men- tioned an amendment to the price control act which would prohibit state and Federal commissions from authorizing utility and common carrier rate increases until the Federal administrator's consent.

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Bankers See Full Life Possibility After War

Some Share Outlook of Government Leaders And Economists Provided Effort Made.

By James Marlow and George Zelle

New York, Sept. 11.—(Wide World)—Pipes dream or possible reality? A post-war world in which all peoples will share in the necessities of life? Government leaders look forward to just such a world. Economists say it can be realized. Some bankers believe the same way, providing the effort is made to achieve it.

Out of the tremendous upheavals in the production and distribution of many industrial raw materials and foodstuffs are coming increased productive capacity, new methods of production, new synthetic materials.

House of Adjustment. The National City Bank of New York, pointing out that these developments will be the backbone of post-war adjustments, says: "All the economic progress mankind has made resulted from the use of new methods of production and distribution of goods and services. There is never over-production but only unbalanced production and under-consumption."

"Fast increase in productive capacity would be caused by re-educating and retraining a higher standard of living all around the world. It is one of the greatest problems of the post-war generation of production and distribution that all may benefit."

Support a plant in this country in post-war years could produce one billion nails and one million hammers and one million saws need for only half that amount which China could use the other half, lacking such a plant of its own.

Half Capacity Wanted. Fifty per cent of that American plant capacity to produce would be wanted unless the half a billion nails and a half a million hammers this country did not need could be transported to China.

However, if there was no need anywhere for that extra 50 per cent capacity of the American plant, it could be used for the production of items that were really needed. The world's great manufacturers now techniques in production. They can be useful after the war.

It is too early yet to predict what will be the post-war great shipbuilding capacity or great fleets of transport planes will have on distributing the world's goods—after the war—into the great cities of the world to lack them entirely or will need them in rebuilding after the war.

Transportation Part of Problem. Transportation is part of the problem, just as will changes in the habits of the people, which now can stop needed product dead at a frontier.

The National City Bank has this to say of some of the current food problems caused by the war: "Manufactures created by the first World War in production and distribution of foodstuffs and products involved mainly the carbohydrates, fats, and dairy products. The most serious dislocations occur at present in the world production of edible and inedible fats. The western hemisphere has been called upon to make good the loss of copra, coconut oil and palm oil from the East Indies, Malaya and The Netherlands East Indies, and at the same time to provide additional oils to cover industrial requirements for explosives and possibly for aviation needs later on.

To fulfill these requirements, the planting of vegetable and fruit crops has been expanded all over the western hemisphere.

Dependent Upon Labor. Development of Brazil's great potential supplies of balsams and other nuts is, however, dependent upon labor and shipping availability. At the same time large surplus of corn and wheat can be fed to livestock to produce animal fats.

The basis has been laid for another wartime expansion of hog production in the United States. (There was an expansion of hog production in this country after the first World war when it declined in western Europe and Scandinavia), for a new hog industry in Canada and Argentina. Argentina and Brazil and possibly other Latin American countries will emerge with important dairy industries.

In the meantime shifts in protein production are taking place also on the continent of Europe. The Germans are striving to make up for the loss of overseas supplies and the decline in livestock production in The Netherlands and Denmark by intensifying hog raising in the Danubian basin as well as by cultivating oilseed crops on a much larger scale.
