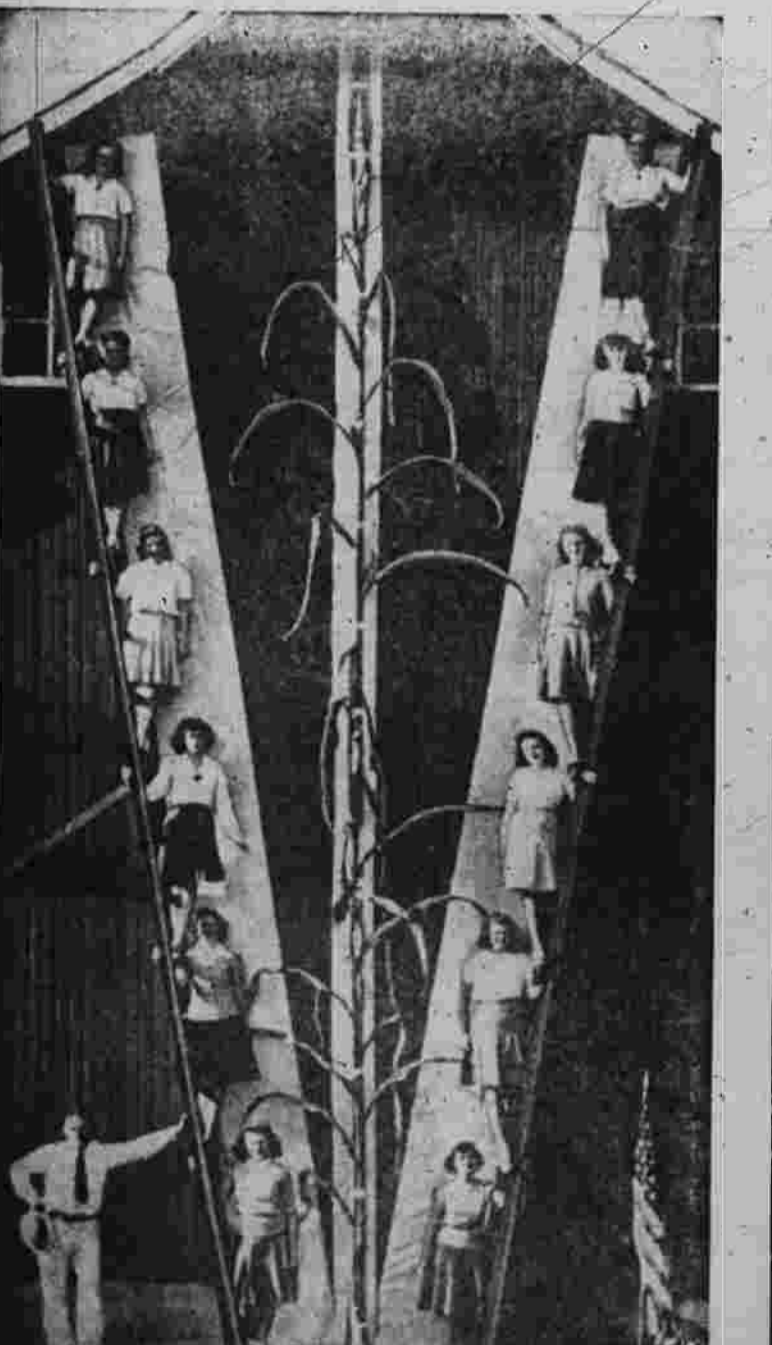

## Building Ships At Record Rate

Washington, Sept. 12.—(AP)—Shipyards geared to war-pace are delivering vessels at an average of every 52.9 days.

The Maritime Commission reported yesterday that this is the fastest rate in history. The Oregon, a 10,000-ton transport, was launched in Portland, Ore., a Henry J. Kaiser outfit, had the highest average—52.2 days—of yards making liberty ships. When contracts for these were let it was estimated that 100 days would be required.

The California Shipbuilding Corporation, Wilmington, Calif., was next, with an average of 61.3 days in August. The Bethlehem Fairfield shipyard, Baltimore, Md., was a close third, at a rate of 61.7 days per ship.

## Chinese Acclaim Madagascan Move

Chungking, Sept. 12.—(AP)—The British decision to complete the occupation of Madagascar was acclaimed by the Chinese press today as a vital step in the Allied conduct of the war.

"By controlling Madagascar," said an editorial in the Kung-Pa Pao, "Britain will be able to protect not only the Cape of Good Hope but the entire Indian ocean, thus defending herself against both Germany and Japan."

The new speechman daily said the move was essential to the achievement of future success and would prevent the Indian ocean from becoming a dead sea.

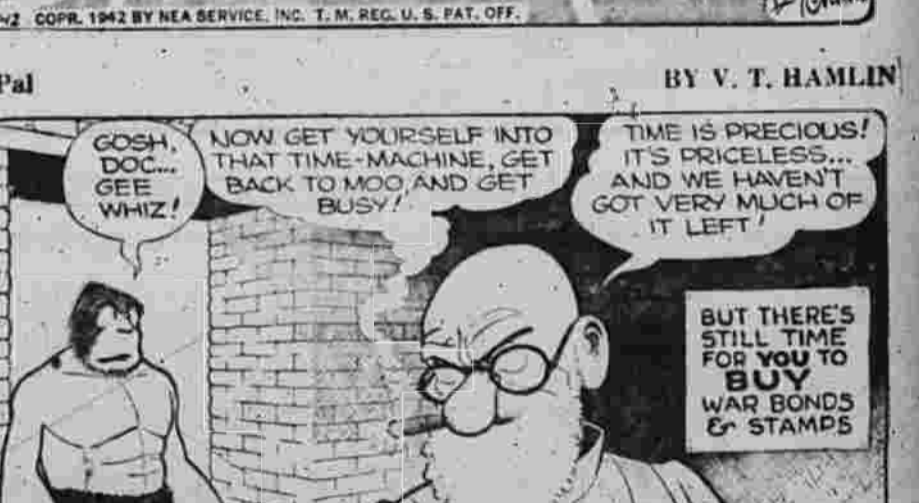
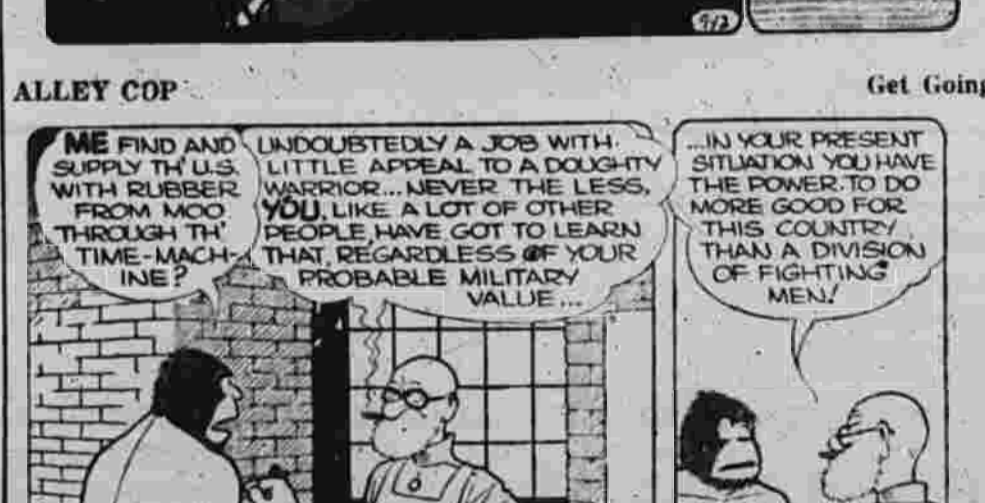
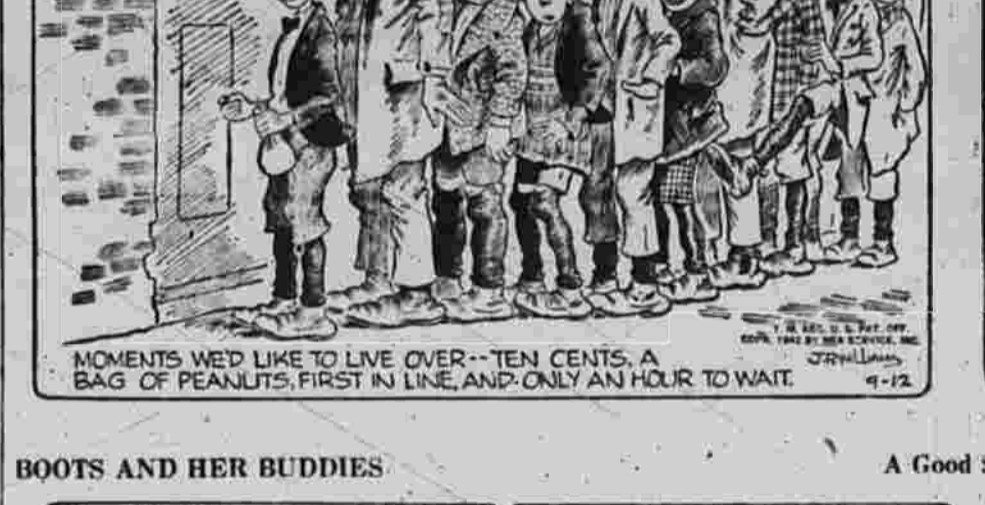
