## Americans Attack Japs on Island

Can Alaskan Army Base, Sept. 16.—(Delayed)—Making the first American fighter plane attack on Japanese-held Kiska island, two pilots moved down a line of troops, machine-gunned a four-motored flying boat and a converted yacht and strafed a machine gun crew.

The fighters made their visit after three bombers under Brig. Gen. William O. Butler, commander of the Alaskan air force, straddled several cargo vessels in a low-level attack on Kiska harbor. The bombers, too, strafed a troop column.

"Havoc" wrought by the two smaller sky raiders included destruction of a Japanese fighter plane on the beach.

Report of the American fighters said the converted yacht attacked might have been a floating command post.

The Japanese, they said, were nearly all under cover by the time they swooped in for a third time. The attackers turned their guns on a large warehouse before starting the return trip.
