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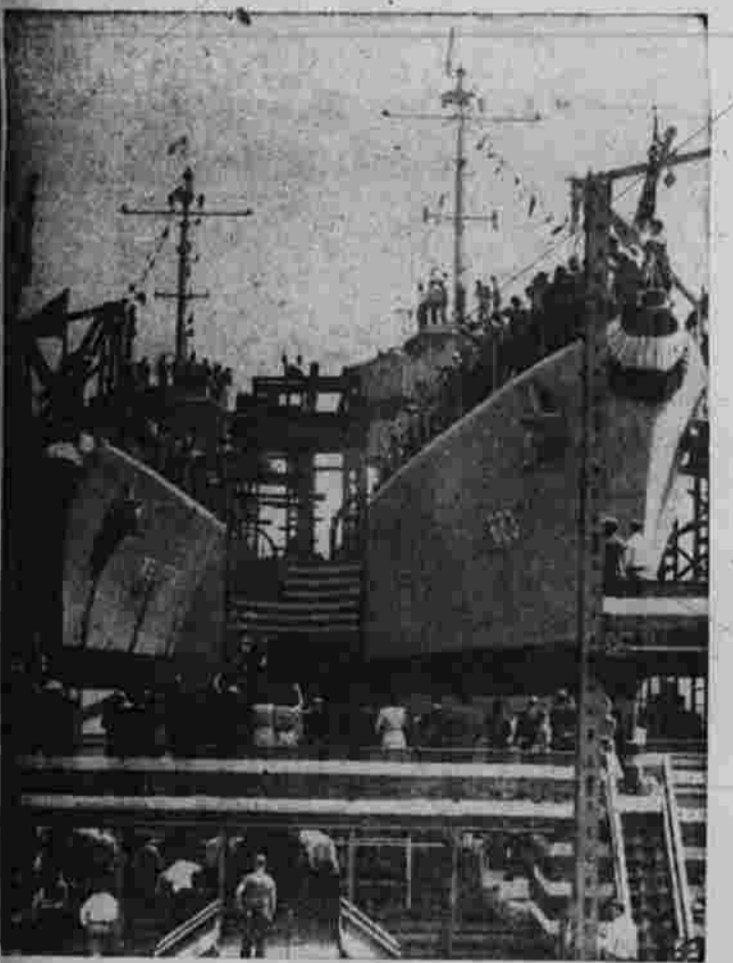
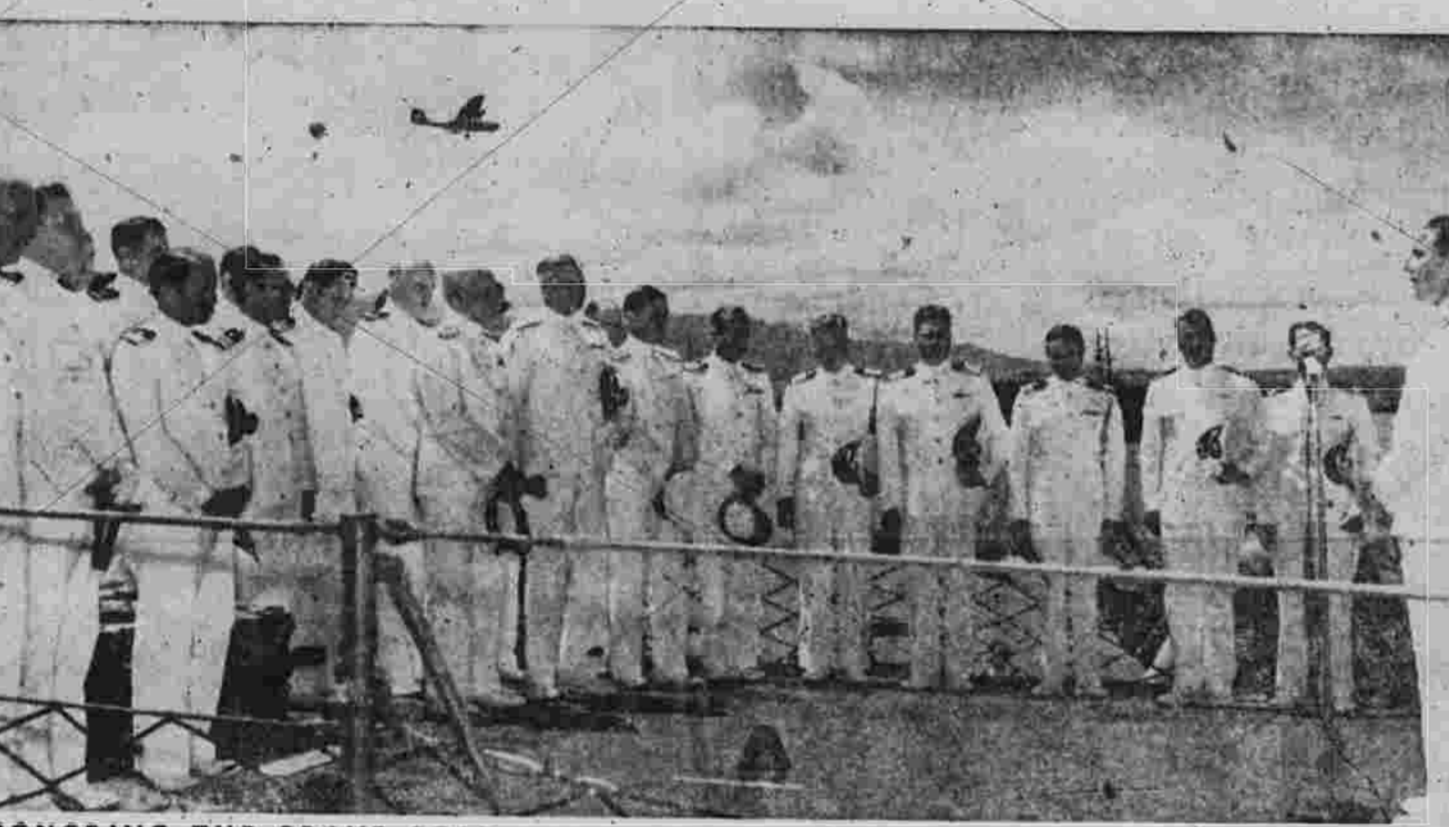
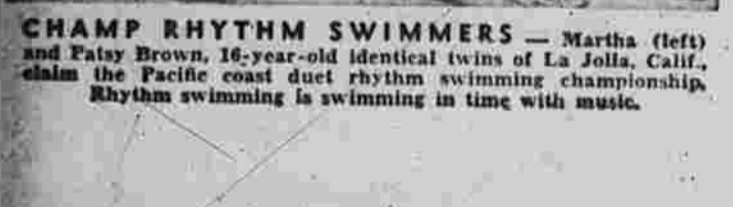

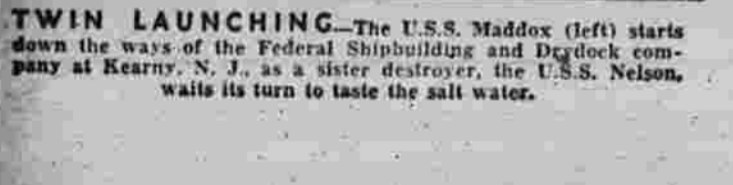

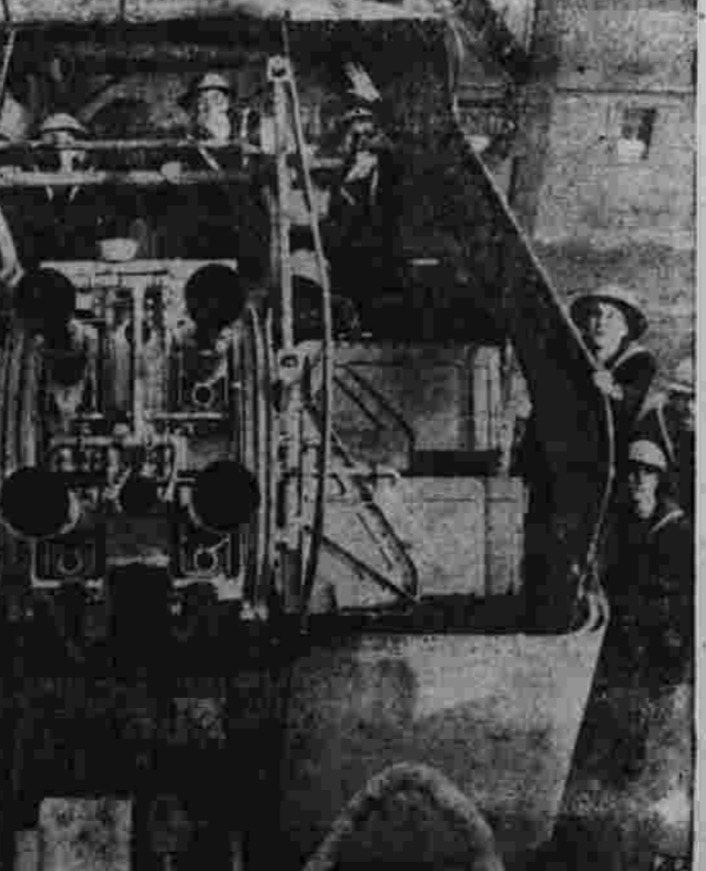
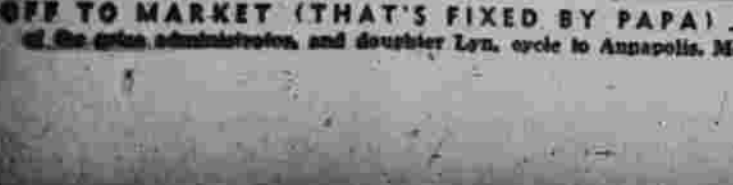

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To Use Taxicabs For War Workers

New York, Sept. 18.—(P)—Hundreds of taxicabs will be driven from the New York scene tomorrow in a wartime conservation measure, but they'll ride just as long as they can be used to transport Long Island street workers to and from their plants, with new men driving them.

The cabs were ordered off New York streets by the Office of Defense Transportation to conserve gasoline and tires.

Operating under the Nassau and Suffolk county defense transportation councils, the taxicabs will supplement existing facilities and afford transportation to workers living in sections where such facilities are limited or overloaded.

They will be rented to the county and each defense worker will pay fares ranging from \$3 to \$3.50 weekly—about the same as they have been paying on bus lines on the Long Island railroad.

Details of the plan were announced by Benjamin Botwinick, president of the Taxicab Bureau, Inc., a group composed of 25 individual taxi owners.
