Churchill Asserts Position Improved; Urges Builders Work Hard.

London, Sept. 23.—Prime Minister Churchill declared today that "although the shipping position has improved recently it still is grave and we are in urgent need of every ship that can be built."

His statement was in a message to a conference of the shipbuilding industry in which he exhorted the builders "in the name of His Majesty's government... to strive your utmost for only this can you compel victory."

The message, which was read at the conference here, assured the builders that this call will be answered by heart and hand and added: "Without ships we cannot live and without them we cannot conquer."

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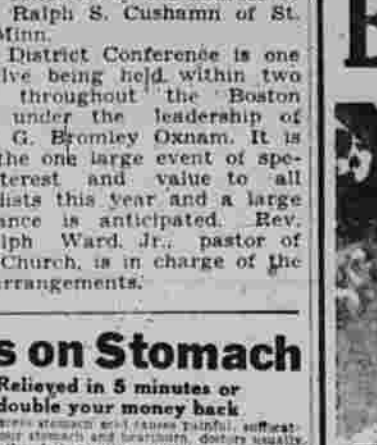

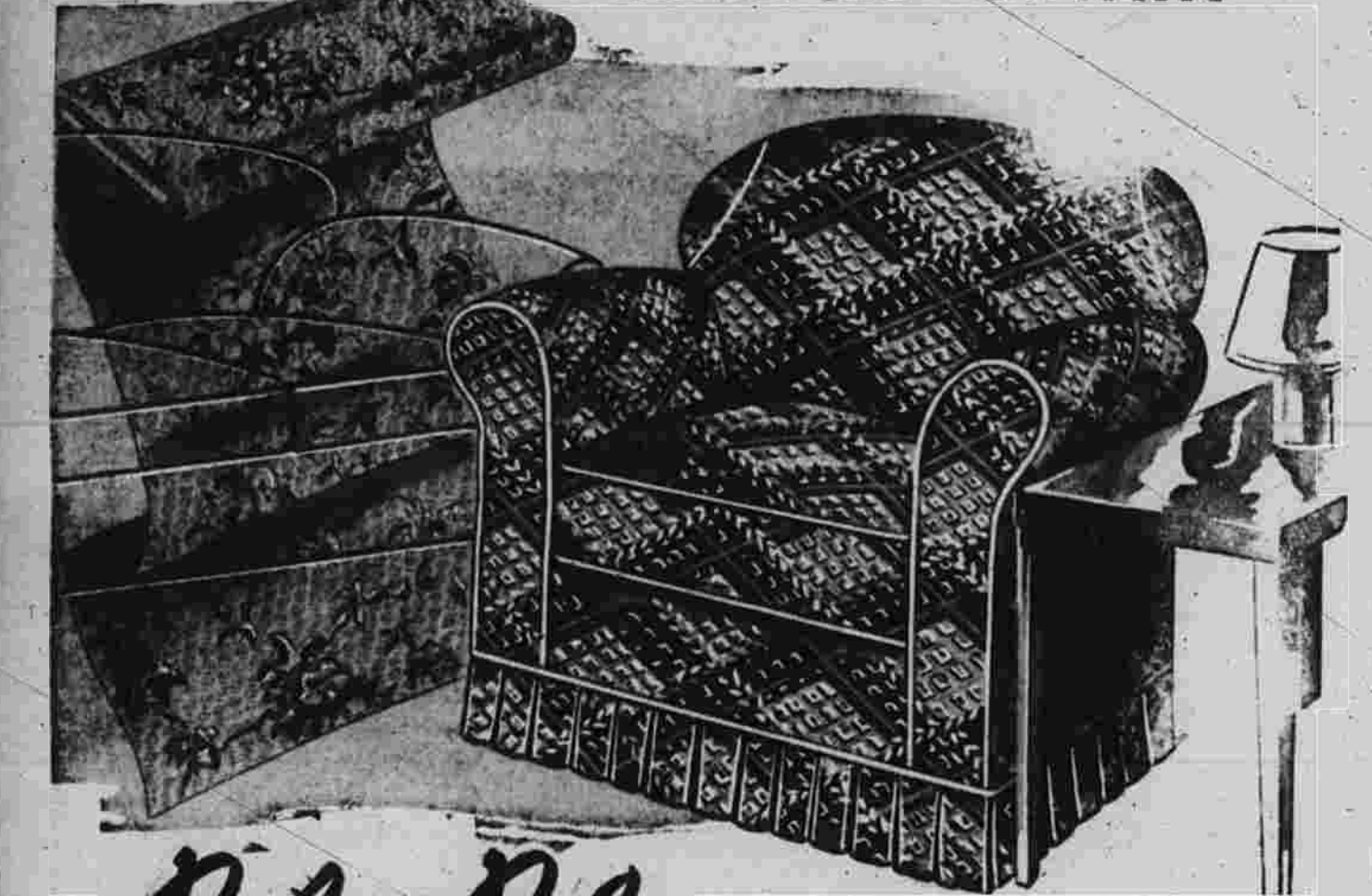
