

Legislature Is Called Into Special Session On Hours for Voting

Hurley Discloses Decision on Oct. 19 as Day of Meeting After Holding Conference With Legislative Council; Places Emphasis on Emergency Situation Faced.

Hartford, Oct. 10.—(AP)—For the first time since 1936, Connecticut's General Assembly has been called into special session on Monday, Oct. 19 to act on legislation, which if approved, would extend voting hours "to a reasonable period beyond 6 p. m." on Nov. 3 and future state elections.

Gov. Robert A. Hurley, after meeting with the Legislative Council, disclosed his decision late yesterday in a lengthy statement during which he placed emphasis on the "extraordinary emergency situation whereby thousands of defense workers are threatened with the loss of their right to vote" because of an apparent inability to cast their ballots between 6 a. m. and 6 p. m. on election day next month.

See Cost About \$3,000

The governor asserted that the members of the Legislative Council, as the recognized leaders of the General Assembly, have assured me that they will exert every influence to control the business of the special session to the single item of legislation extending voting hours to a reasonable period beyond 6 p. m., and that the cost would not exceed \$3,000, a statement challenged by William L. Hadden, Republican leader of the House.

Hadden, a member of the Legislative Council and the party's candidate for lieutenant governor, claimed that the Democratic governor's statement, which he had understood was going to be brief, not only violates his Governor Hurley's promise concerning the substance of the announcement to be made by him, but in most details failed to present an accurate picture of the proceeding.

Hadden denied that there had been an agreement to limit the business of the session.

And indications that the session may not only consider other matters, but may extend beyond one day were in evidence last night when Rep. Otto H. Grossman, a Republican from Groton, said he would introduce a bill to have the state relieve the tolls of the New London bridge, which he claimed, will fall heavily on the car workers going to plants in Groton because of the reduction in transit traffic due to the gasoline and rubber shortage.

Favors Extension of Hours

Hadden revealed in his statement that he personally favored the extension of the voting hours.

Governor Hurley, in his statement, said:

"It is my firm conviction that the right to vote is among the most precious assets of every American. For months I have urged every defense worker to do his utmost to contribute to the war effort, but I have not asked for additional effort in the discharge of his duty.

Argentina and Chile Protest Welles' Talk

Willkie Starts Journey Home

Buenos Aires, Oct. 10.—(AP)—Argentina and Chile, the only American nations maintaining relations with the Axis, formally protested today assertions by Acting Secretary of State Sumner Welles that the two countries are being used as bases by Axis agents.

Both governments issued strong notes categorically rejecting Welles' statement in Boston Thursday night that ship bookings in Argentina and Chile were due in part to the activity of Axis spies operating within their borders.

Loyal to Neighbors

They declared in effect that they were loyal to their American neighbors and that Welles had painted a false picture of their relations with their western hemisphere neighbors.

Observers here expressed belief in the official reaction of the two governments had dealt a virtual death blow to Allied hopes that they might soon carry out recommendations of the Rio de Janeiro conference by severing all ties with the Axis.

Chilean Foreign Minister Ernesto Baros Jara noted in a formal statement that Welles' speech came just as President Juan Antonio Rios was preparing to visit the United States. Government sources here speculated on the possibility that the President might postpone his trip pending an explanation from Washington.

Allied Airmen Hit Jap Supply Base, Start Big Blazes

London, Oct. 10.—(AP)—American flying fortresses and Liberators bombers—home from the greatest Allied daylight attack yet launched against Hitler's war factories—again have amazed British air experts, who know from grim experience the hazards of daylight operations.

The return of all but four of the 109 United States bombers which left the base of the American air force at Wendover, Mo., occupied France with an escort of 500 Allied fighter planes yesterday and unloaded tons of bombs on factories and railroad yards apparently ended any lingering doubts concerning the effectiveness of the flying fortresses. All of the fighters returned safely, it was reported.

British air correspondents said the weight of the American attack far exceeded the best daylight efforts of the Germans during the "Blitz" of September, 1940. Fifty German bombers and 200 fighters over England in daylight then constituted a "big raid."

Down Five Nazi Fighters

On the last day of the Battle of Britain, Sept. 15, 1940, the Germans sent 246 planes in two groups of 200 each and lost at least 155 of them. The Allied fighters reported shooting down at least five German fighters yesterday and the score of the bombers has not been tallied officially. None of the German planes used against Britain could carry the loads which the four-motored United States bombers transported to Lille yesterday. The fortresses can carry three tons of bombs, the Liberators four.

Liberators are faster than the fortresses, but are not as formidable fighting craft as the latter, which have proved themselves kings of the air in daylight operations. The Liberators crews claimed the destruction of seven Nazi fighters for the loss of one of their own planes.

China Is Told Extra Rights to Be Lifted

Washington, Oct. 10.—(AP)—Embattled China today had British and American assurances that her post-war sovereignty will be free of the fetters of extraterritoriality.

In simultaneous London and Washington announcements, timed to coincide with the 31st anniversary of the revolution which China became a republic, the two governments made known last night their intention to join with China in abolishing the system of extraterritorial rights and special privileges for foreigners which Chinese long have felt impinged upon their freedom.

To Submit Treaty Notes

Speaking for the United States, Acting Secretary of State Welles said that a draft treaty now being submitted to his government providing for the "immediate relinquishment" of such rights by this country.

Amassador Wainwright promptly issued a statement hailing the move as the beginning of a "new era in the Chinese relations with the western powers."

It will put an end, he said, to an out-dated and outworn system, greatly encourage China in her fight for freedom, and provide "definite assurance to all freedom-loving peoples of the world that the United States and Britain are directed toward achieving political freedom everywhere and equality of rights among all nations."

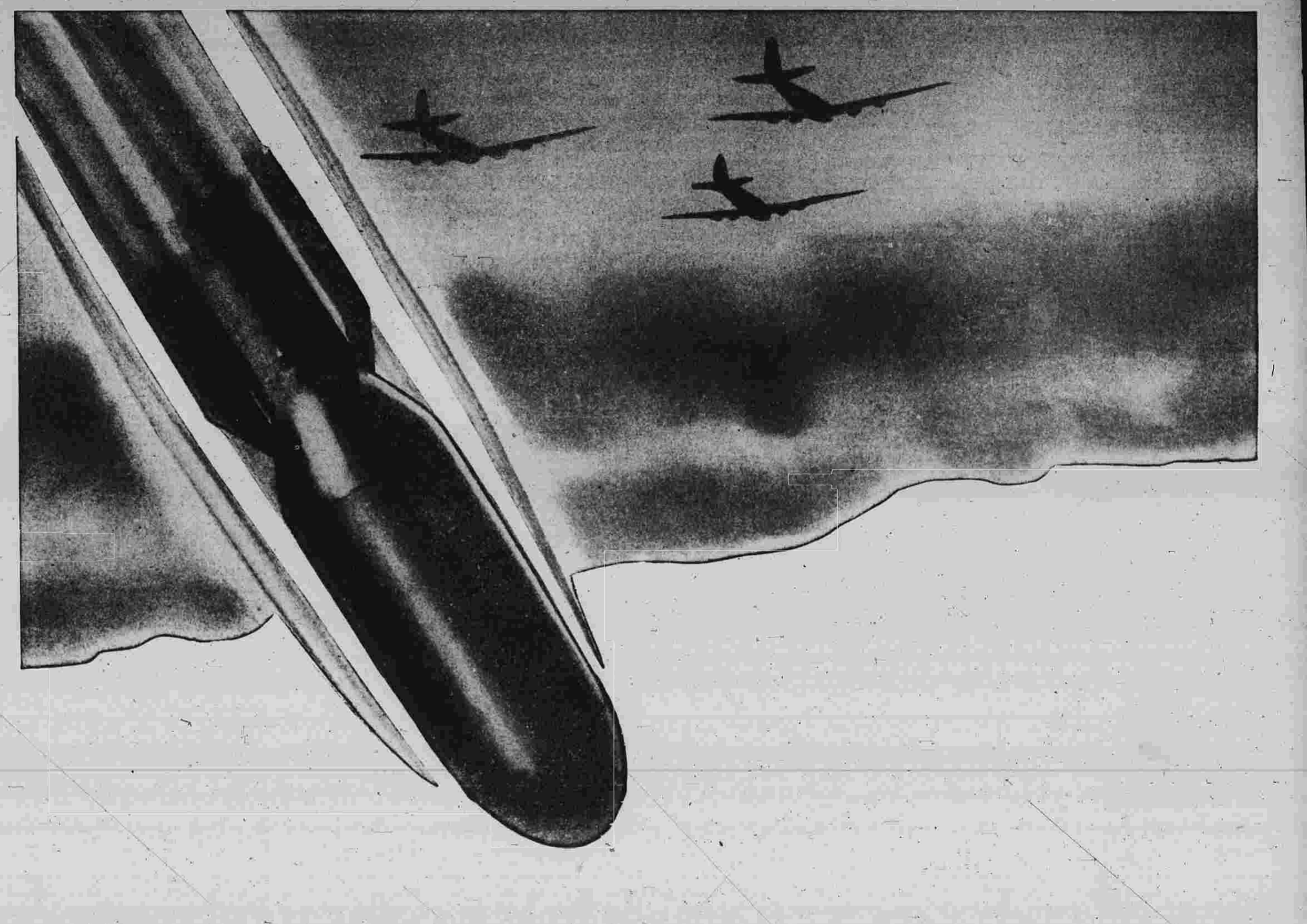
