Johnson Opposes Sending Children To Fight Battles

Pre-Pearl Harbor Foe of Oil Control eign Policies Argues Against Legislation For Drafting Youths Of 18 and 19 Years.

Washington, Oct. 23 .-- (AP) -Senator Johnson (R., Cal.), told his colleagues today he was opposed to "calling of children to fight our battles in the first open Senate opposition to legislation for drafting 18 and 19-year-olds. The white-haired Californian, a pre-Pearl Harbor opponent of the administration's foreign policies, declared that passage of the leg-islation meant that many children were going to be sent to death in foreign parts of the world.

Seen Ready to Fight Asserting that no man wanted more to win the war than he, Johnson said he could not stand idly by and see a generation deci-He had no doubt, he said that the 18 and 19 year olds were ready to fight.

"If they are liquidated_these children—no generation will re-main in this country to build it up

Double Slaying Baffles Police

Wife of Wealthy Radio Manufacturer and Her Maid Killed in Chicago.

Evanston, Ill., Oct. 23-(P)-Cook county state's attorney police joined Evanston authorities today in the investigation of the slaying of a wealthy radio manufacturer's wife and her maid, whose bodies were found last night in the living room of their home in the exclusive residential section of this Chicago suburb.

The slain women were Mrs. Lillian Galvin, 45, wife of Paul V. Galvin, who was reported en route home from Washington where he had been on government business, and Miss Edna Sibilski, 30-yearold farmer's daughter.
Robbery May Be Motive






