

When he learned of this situation, Cooper felt that The Associated Press by its contract was a party to this suppression of legitimate news in many countries, and that it was not defensible to continue a contract guaranteeing any agency a monopoly of a nation outside its own territory, or even in its home territory if by so doing it kept the people of that nation in the dark.

"Out of this convention came my idea that The Associated Press news standards should prevail everywhere," he wrote. "Later I realized this would be impossible unless access at the source to the news of all nations should be denied to no one."
