Takes 7 Lives

To The Consumers of The Hartford Gas Company:

The Hartford Gas Company may be faced with shortages of gas in periods of extremely cold weather during the coming winter. The necessity of devoting as much as possible of our critical materials to direct war production has made it impossible to permit the expansion of gas production and transmission facilities to the extent necessary to safeguard gas service to all consumers. Vital war industries and essential civilian services are dependent upon an adequate and uninterrupted supply of gas from your local gas company. In the event that there should be a gas shortage, the supply of gas for such purposes must be protected by curtailing the consumption of other consumers.

The War Production Board has accordingly adopted Limitation Order L-174, which provides for the curtailment of the consumption of manufactured gas in any community where a gas shortage occurs or is imminent. This order imposes upon all gas consumers and gas companies the responsibility for insuring a constant supply of gas for war production

Whenever a gas shortage is imminent in your community you will be notified of the fact by local radio announcement, through the local press, or by other means. Upon such notification you must take all steps necessary to reduce the consumption of gas in your home to a minimum. The following means should be employed to reduce your gas consumption:

Use your range for cooking only, not for heating. Range use for heating purposes imposes such a large burden upon gas supplies in periods of shortage as to threaten a complete breakdown of gas service in your

Don't use your oven, but only the surface heating units. Postpone all baking Do all cooking at one time for each meal. Use prepared foods to the greatest extent possible.

2. Your gas water heater

If you have a tank heater which is not automatic, don't use it.

If you have an automatic heater, or if your gas furnace has a coil heater, t

as little hot water as possible. Skip your daily bath or shower. When you take one, use a minimum amount Postpone wash-day and house-cleaning where hot water is needed.

3. Your gas house-heater

Set your thermostat back as far as conditions in your home will permit, but in no event less than 5 degrees below your normal setting. Live in as few rooms as possible and shut off the heat in other rooms. Shut off the heat in bedrooms if you can possibly do so.

These are small sacrifices. If all consumers cooperate, it will be possible to maintain service to war industries and to hospitals and other essential civilian services during periods of gas shortage. Such sacrifices will represent an important and patriotic contribution to the

If consumers shall fail to control their gas use in the manner suggested, it may become necessary in the event of a gas shortage to discontinue all gas service to entire neighborhoods in order to avoid a breakdown of gas service in your community.

Extreme conservation in the use of gas is essential during cold spells to prevent a complete breakdown in gas service. However, careful conservation is equally important throughout the year to avoid burdening war production. Large volumes of oil and coal, requiring extensive use of the country's limited transportation facilities, are used in the manufacture of gas. Oil, coal and transportation are critical factors in our war economy. We urge you to exercise every reasonable economy in your every day use of gas for heating and cooking. You will thereby assist in making these fuels and transportation facilities avail able in prosecuting the war.

The maintenance of war production and the avoidance of severe disruption of community life in periods of gas shortage, as well as the conservation of critical fuels and transportation through savings in the use of gas, depend on your full cooperation.


