Jack Pearl Leaves Radio After Thirteen Weeks Run

New York, Jan. 6.—After a run of 13 weeks, Jack Pearl and his "radio" (Charlie Hall) say goodbye to their radio audience again at 9:15 tonight. It is their third departure from a microphone since the last decade of the '20s.

The program on MBS which Pearl is leaving, continuing, however, as a basic musical show built around Norman Corwin's orchestra, which also is continuing, augmented by a 10-minute drama from the pen of Norman Corwin. He has been active in radio writing for several years, presenting CBS. In place of Pearl there will be guests from the world, starting next week with Benny Goodman and Oscar Levant in a presentation of "Crazy" and "Rhapsody in Blue."

Bind Reynolds, remaining as senior soloist, and soprano Jean Merrill is dropping out. Pearl is expected to go into Broadway drama, one of the reasons given for his departure. Another reason is that the Pearl comedy and the Gould music did not blend into a suitable broadcast.

"We will go forward until we achieve victory and a lasting peace," says the Governor in his inaugural address to the General Assembly. He calls for "speedy, effective action" in all war matters and post-war planning.

Selected Paragraphs Of Baldwin's Speech To the Legislature

"Speedy, effective action" called for in the post-war period. The Governor emphasizes the need for prompt legislative action to support the war effort.

Broader executive powers, including the right to make rules and appoint committees subject to legislative control, will be requested.

The State Defense Council's powers to be more fully defined and present methods of administration of protective services improved.

A War Council, with membership chosen from labor, management and government will be created to integrate the prosecution of the war.

Authority to renew the no-strike labor-management compact is requested.

Public Works Department eliminated and the State departments to be streamlined for war.

The farmer's labor problem will be studied and a program of recruitment of workers for the farm and for industry will be undertaken at once.

A Commission to be appointed to draw up a comprehensive judicial Act.

Automobile operators' license fees and taxes may be graduated in accord with use of vehicle.

There are to be no capital expenditures and no new highway construction until the war is over, and plans are to be made at once for a program of construction to be entered upon when peace comes.

A pre-war planning commission will immediately undertake to determine a comprehensive program for converting to a peace basis at the conclusion of the war.
