New Red Offensive On Voronezh Front Showing Progress

German Lines Are Being Rolled Back by Slaying Attacks Against Garrisoned in Fortified Cities and Towns, Villages; Direction of Main Thrust Aimed At Ukraine, Kharkov.

Moscow, Jan. 18.—(AP)—The Red Army's new offensive on the Voronezh front, most northerly of the series of winter blows against the whole Axis position in the southwest, was making new progress today, 80 miles west of the Don along the railway to Kupansk and Kharkov.

Full Division Encircled Between the Don and the new front line at least one full German division was declared virtually encircled and driven from the rear eastward.

Old Russian forces driving down the rail line to Rostov captured Millerovo reached the north bank of the Don and are in a sharp threat to Kamenka.

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### Local Youth Figures In South Seas Saga

Victor (Jim) Fitzgerald, With Two Companions Adrift on Raft After Warship is Sunk.

One of the greatest of experiences in this war thus far, has been recorded in the official diary of the Navy Department by a New Britain Navy aviator, a Naval Lieutenant and a Manchester boy, Victor James Fitzgerald, 17, 136 Biassell street, son of Mr. and Mrs. William L. Fitzgerald.

Sea Filled With Sharks As members of the crew of the life rafts were by Signalman Joseph P. Hartney, a Signalman who was the principal in the almost unbelievable saga of the South Seas. Life Or Death Matter It was a life or death matter as the raft was then floating out of the reach of the group of men hanging on to bits of wreckage waiting for a life raft to aid the floating survivors. The raft full of water of the inflated waters of the Coral Sea beside the grave of the aviator, young Fitzgerald, of the life rafts.

For the next several days and nights the two aviators and the Naval officer suffered extreme hardships on their little life raft. They were without food or water, day by day they suffered from the equatorial sun; by night the cold was cruel on their scantily clad bodies. They sang and prayed to keep their spirits alive.

Signalman Hartney paddled while Fitzgerald kept his arms around Lieutenant Wang to keep him alive. The officer was wrapped up in pieces of wreckage from the ocean near where the Japanese sank Lieutenant Wang at this time was a strenuous condition.

Tortuous days and nights passed for the Manchester and New Britain boys in the life raft. The boys battled the storm and fought to keep the raft afloat. They salvaged much needed water for themselves and the wounded officer. Most of the salvaged water went to the injured lieutenant.

He needed it more than we did, said Hartney yesterday. "It was a game guy. The boys carried their officer companion up the beach and laid him on the sand. It was difficult for the sailors to walk as they had been huddled up so long in the cramped quarters. The three slept the sleep of the dead.
