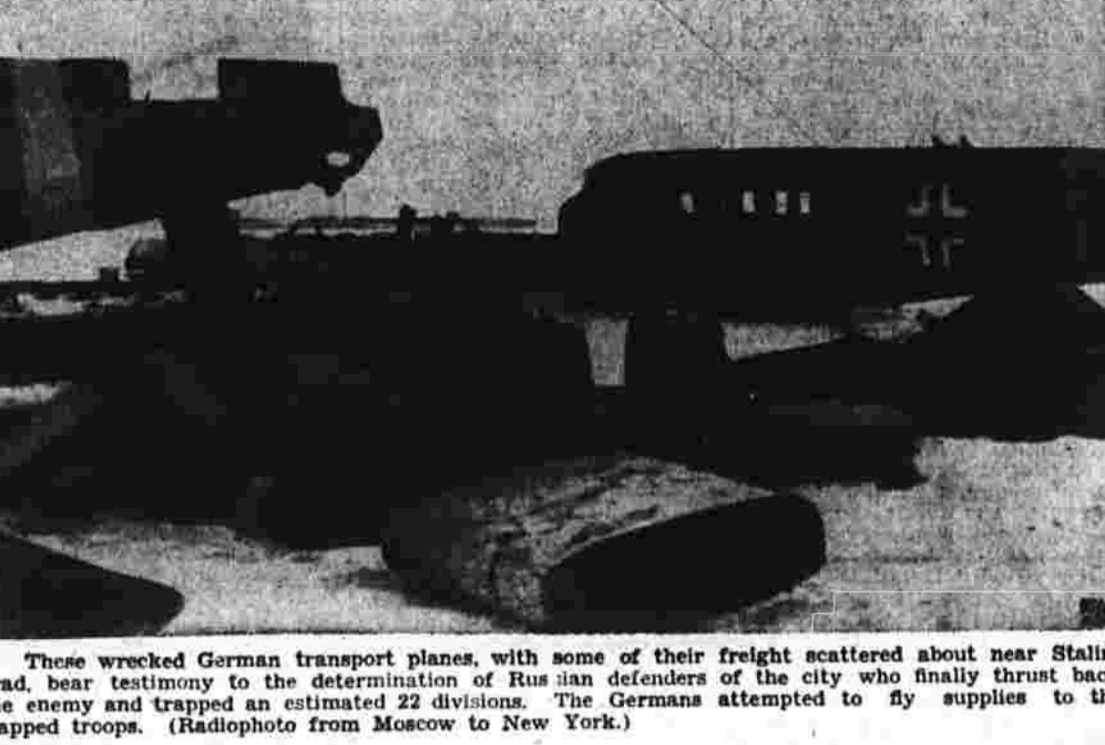

# "We Americans Are Living a Free and Easy Life"

## So Decides Reporter Home From Europe—and Nazi Internment Camp

San Francisco—You're gasping, rubber-hungry, about a new once-plaintful household article. Now meat rationing has its shadow over your dining table, so maybe you think this war's getting pretty tough for the housewife.

Well, to one who has lived under "conditions" in Europe, meat rationing is a piece of cake. The United States more sharply highlights the fact that we Americans are living a free-and-easy life in contrast to Europe's man-made hardships.

That contrast is, perhaps, my most vivid picture now that I have been back in the United States long enough to achieve some perspective on the conditions against the background of my years in Europe's war-torn streets. Particularly vivid is the contrast with Germany, where the first few months of my stay were spent in concentration centers as the enemy alien "guest" of the Gestapo.

For instance, back home in the States, I accompanied my wife to the grocery on a marketing trip. The place was a market place in a hurry, so we left and bought our goods at another store. It was impossible in the States to buy a long line ahead of people. Supplies may be exhausted in one store, but they may not go to another store. This is the result of the German system of rationing, where everyone stops eating and waiting in a half-hour line to get their share of the ration. During the previous month and a half I saw shop only between 5 and 6 o'clock.

A noticeable thing in America is the abundance of foodstuffs against darker days. In Germany, this is punishable by death. However, the urge to eat is a natural one, and the Germans find it difficult to resist their insatiable hunger. Old-fashioned dressers, simple curtains, and a few other things are easily marketed.

One German girl wrote to a friend of mine: "I have just bought a marvelous old lampshade. Pretty well battered, but you know, but I'm keeping it in the attic as an investment." It was amazing, upon returning to America, to find persons in restaurants treating strange streets severely criticizing our government and hardly any notice for persons around town.

In contrast to a scene which occurred one evening in a small beer parlor in Berlin. Some officers were discussing the war—a dangerous pastime at best. One of them belittled our army, saying: "Well, we'll show the world when this is over."

Another soldier at the table answered my question: "Yes, but this war isn't over yet." He then asked me to get up and let quiet. Fifteen minutes later the Gestapo entered, arrested the soldier who had been "defeating" my suggestion the war will last some time.

Sitting in an American restaurant one day, I was startled by the blaring of a radio loudspeaker. Then, as it brought the play-by-play action of a baseball game, I sank back thoughtfully in my chair.
