The Fight Was Over Anyway

It was in 1933 that the American Medical Association and its affiliate, the District of Columbia Medical Society, looked upon the group health plan as something to be fought with every means available. The fight was over, however, according to the testimony given in the series of court trials which have followed. The "compulsory" health plan is now a reality, cooperating with such group health plans and to boycott physicians who had anything to do with such plans.

Now, four years later, the Supreme Court rules that the medical societies acted illegally in such warfare upon the group health plan. More important than the decision, we think, is the probability that the same doctors who fell so bitterly about the prospect of group health organizations in 1933 have themselves changed their minds in the four years. The group health idea itself has evolved, and has limited its self to the payment of bills for the members of the group, rather than the payment of the actual medical bills. The important change has been general recognition that it's a good idea for everyone to take care of their own health and hospital and medical insurance, not for the purpose of "socializing" medicine, but for the purpose of affording and pay for more adequate medical treatment than many American families have at present.

Your Federal Income Tax

Information of vital interest to those who must file a tax return is published by the Bureau of Internal Revenue.

(7) Have permanent or long-term traffic court magistrates, supervised by a chief traffic court magistrate with regulatory powers.

Beginning Monday, February 1, this wartime reminder will be given by your Information Operator when you ask for a number that is listed in your directory.

We regret this departure from our peacetime practice of giving telephone numbers cheerfully and without comment whenever they are requested; but today, when war calls are flooding telephone lines, there is an immediate and impelling necessity to cut down the number of unnecessary calls.

Every day in Connecticut, 61,000 calls to information are made for numbers that are in the telephone directory. Our records show that each call takes 36 seconds. This adds up to a total of 611 hours lost each day. Thus the full time of 76 operators and much central office equipment are tied up for calls that in most cases need not have been made at all.

In peacetime we would build new equipment, add more operators to care for these calls, but today the same material that goes into telephone facilities is going into materials of war.

We feel sure that in the light of the war necessity you will accept the reminder of your Information Operator in the spirit in which it is intended -- a simple bid for your co-operation in helping to keep telephone lines clear for important war messages.
