



### Cold Wave Is Record Here for 26 Years

#### Temperature Drops Again as Travel Is Badly Interrupted, Few People Brave Weather

Thursday, February 16, will probably be recorded in the weather records of Manchester as the coldest day in 26 years. There have been days as cold in certain spots in the town but the present cold wave is certainly the coldest since 1916.

The current cold wave followed a mild monotony which has been continuing since Saturday and continued until 10 p. m. Saturday. High winds whipped up the snow early Sunday morning, and then the cold wave descended on the heads of the storm.

In several sections, wind drifts were blocked with snow drifts, and the cold weather hampered efforts to clear the streets.

Yesterday temperatures of from 15 to 32 degrees were recorded for the first time in many years and the temperature did not rise above 2 degrees below zero. The wind was brilliant sunshine all day.

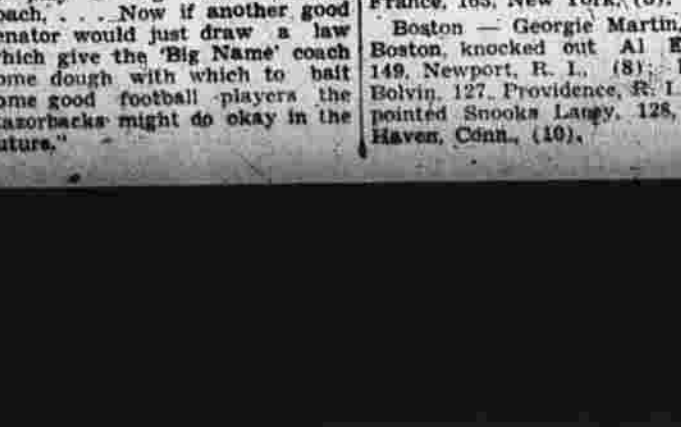
