Allied Units Crush Axis Push Toward Base at Tebessa

United States and British Troops Guarding Stabilized Mountain Line in Central Tunisia; Change in Tide Seen in Two Setbacks.

United States and British troops guarding a stabilized mountain line in central Tunisia have crushed an attempt by Marshal Rommel's forces to thrust again toward the Algerian base of Tebessa...

Agree Ties Has Turbulent As a result of the setbacks to the Allied forces, military authorities here agreed that the Tunisian offensive probably would be limited hereafter to active jobs at the Allied mountain line in a search for weak spots.

It was announced that Gen. Sir Harold Alexander, former commander of the British Eighth Army in the Near East, had assumed personal command of the Allied ground forces in Tunisia...

Bad Weather Hampers Files. Bad weather, meanwhile, curtailed air operations because of rain and high winds swept most of Tunisia.

As Allied communique revealed that all American, British and French troops had withdrawn from forward positions in the Ouedjatta valley, running between mountain chains extending 50 miles south west of the Axis base at Pont Du Rhod.

Report of this apparently limited maneuver—a movement from the eastern to the western front—was accompanied by the disclosure of engagements in two regions to the southwest.

Several enemy tanks and self-propelled guns were destroyed near the Ouedjatta valley, indicating that Axis armored units were probing Allied defenses as far as 25 miles northwest of the winding rail line between Sverran and the mountains which they overran earlier in the week.

San Juan, Puerto Rico, Feb. 20.—(AP)—Seemingly heavy-jowled Luis Munoz Marin, leader of the Populars (majority) party and president of the insular Senate, might well lay claim to the highest achievement in Puerto Rican history since American occupation.

For the first time in 43 years, members of all parties acted through their own legislature have joined forces behind a single document beseeching the United States to end the island's colonial status.

Being a smart politician—one of the island's smartest—Munoz doesn't claim the credit, but insists it is the result of combined efforts toward the Puerto Ricans' universal aspiration, expressed in the joint resolution, to decide its own future.

The resolution is directly traceable to the wester of discussion and argument over Governor Tugwell and his administration and over the "resolutions" in the "manifesto" most of which the Populars initiated and put through the Legislature.

Canned Goods Ration Cuts Normal Amount Used to Under Half

'Scant Ration' Program Starts Next Monday; March Allowance Provides Only About Three Cans Per Person for Month; Civilian Supply Reduced To 30,000,000 Cases.

Washington, Feb. 22.—(AP)—American householders are to be allowed less than half of the canned fruits and vegetables the government has authorized for use in the "scant ration" program starting next Monday.
