Then for five days running they were attacked by subs and planes. In one attack by a wave of 42 planes with torpedoes and bombs, several ships were sunk, and submarines got more.

The Germans were hitting hard to get the convoy. They paid a heavy price.

"I saw at least 40 German planes shot down." Adams said.
