Billion Dollar Doubts Taxes

Expect State Will Pay So Much on the Income Tax for Last Year.

Hartford, April 1- (P) -The Treasury department has received yardstick, that Federal taxes of all kinds in the state will likely reach the record-shattering figure of one billion dollars by the end of the current year.

Collector Thomas S. Smith of Hartford, who together with his taff was congratulated by Segretary Morganthau for completing the income tax filing period under gard for length of hours, was hesitant about "making predictions." But Assistant Collector Frank

W. Kraemer held that the billionmark is not an unlikely figure for all collections including income, victory and miscellaneous classes, on the basis of known deposits. This compares with \$425,000,000 last year and \$181,000,000 the year

For First Quarter Figures from the office of Comp-troller C. Sheldon Heywood showed \$136,000,000 deposited in the banks from income tax collections time went over \$100,000,000, showed deposits of \$15,500,000. This against 34 million last year and 15 million the year before. In pointing out the basis for an

stimate for the current year, Mr. Kraemer said income taxpayers this year are overwhelmingly prements. So great was the rush of returns, which numbered 900,000 against 625,000 last year, that a large proportion of the mail has not been cleared.

Mr. Kraemer believed that an additional \$25,000,000 in payments filed by March 15 is still to be deing the income tax payments rela-tive to the first quarter to more than \$160,000,000. It will be three weeks before the mail dated up to March 15 will be entirely cleared.
