Billion Dollar Total Is Seen Expect State Will Pay So Much on the Income Tax for Last Year.

Hartford, April 1—(AP)—The Treasury department has received \$900,000,000 taxable and nontaxable income tax returns from Connecticut residents for 1942 and indicated today, using the first quarter as a yardstick, that Federal taxes of all kinds in the state will likely reach the record-shattering figure of one billion dollars by the end of the current year.

Collector Thomas S. Smith of Hartford, who together with his staff was congratulated by Secretary Morgenthau for completing the income tax filing period under trying conditions and without regard for length of hours, was hesitant about "making predictions."

But Assistant Collector Frank W. Kraemer held that the billion-dollar mark is not an unlikely figure for all collections including income, victory and miscellaneous classes, on the basis of known deposits. This compares with \$425,000,000 last year and \$181,000,000 the year before.

For First Quarter
Figures from the office of Comptroller C. Sheldon Heywood showed \$138,000,000 deposited in the banks from income tax collections in the quarter ended last night, March alone, which for the first time went over \$100,000,000, showed deposits of \$15,000,000. This compares with \$12,000,000 last year and \$15 million the year before.

In pointing out the basis for an estimate for the current year, Mr. Kraemer said income taxpayers this year are overwhelmingly preferring quarterly installment payments. Sixty percent of the returns, which numbered 900,000 against 625,000 last year, that a large proportion of the mail has not been cleared.

Mr. Kraemer believed that an additional \$20,000,000 in payments filed by March 15 is still to be deposited with banks in April, bringing the income tax payments relative to the first quarter to more than \$160,000,000. It will be three weeks before the mail dated on March 15 will be entirely cleared.

The other is the Bankhead bill—now before the president, and which might have to be passed over his expected veto in that case—which excludes farm benefit payments in figuring parity price formulas. The bill, passed by the House and returned to the Agriculture committee by the Senate, which includes farm labor costs in setting parity prices.

Lieut. Luther M. Bolton, a commission agent before he entered the Army, testified today that he realized a net of \$24,345 after expenses and Federal taxes in 1942 for obtaining government war contracts for manufacturers.

As the House Naval committee pressed its inquiry into activities of war brokers, Robert E. Kline, committee counsel, said that he would show that Bolton, upon entering the Navy, turned over his interest in pending contracts to "father."

less destroyed," although the Japanese still cling to the shore of Lake Tunzang, the spokesman said. He reported severe fighting south of the Burma road where the Japanese attempted to take the town of Talo in unannounced moves near the Burma border.

During the week, the spokesman said, the Chinese repulsed 13 Japanese attacks in different localities and launched 17 of their own.

The high command said in a communique that in the Talo area the Japanese had suffered 300 casualties in one sector alone while a reinforced Japanese column tried to cross the Talo river was repulsed with 100 casualties.

Observers believed the Japanese wanted to take the town of Talo as a prelude to a campaign aimed at reducing Chinese strongholds near the Burma-French Indo-China border.

Chineses Continue Attacks
In Hunan province, the high command said the Chinese were continuing their attacks near Kwajung, whose possession enabled the Japanese to dominate one of the richest rice producing regions of China.

The Chinese broke into one town in the region, the high command said, but the Japanese counter-attacked under air cover and an artillery barrage and "see-saw fighting now is in progress in the suburbs."

British Fliers Attack Oil Installations
New Delhi, April 1—(AP)—Oil installations at Bhamo and railway yards at Mandalay were R. A. F. targets in raids on Burma yesterday, a British communique announced today.

Fires were started in the main oil storage buildings, enemy barracks and other buildings, the British said, in the daylight attack on Bhamo, on the Irrawaddy east of Kana.

Darkness hid the results of the attack on the Mandalay yards, it was announced. The war bulletin also said that a light British Naval craft braved Japanese fire from the shore of the Ayeyar river, north of Ayeyar, to sink three or four Japanese motor launches Tuesday night. Ten R. A. F. Hurricanes engaged 12 Japanese fighters in aerial duels over the Buthidaung area of Burma yesterday, the British said, and one enemy aircraft was destroyed.

From this operation and other offensive patrols the British said that three R. A. F. planes failed to return although the pilot of one of them was believed safe.

Japanese Claim 20 Planes Destroyed
By The Associated Press
A Japanese Imperial headquarters announcement broadcast by the Tokyo radio today asserted that Japanese air units raiding in eastern India and along the Arakan coast in Burma destroyed 20 Allied planes between March 28 and 30, sank one ship and damaged four others besides setting Allied military installations ablaze.

The claims were not confirmed by Allied sources. The ship sunk was a 1,000-ton transport, the Japanese announcement said. The damaged ships were 500-tonners, it was claimed.

The Japanese said they had bombed Maungdaw, Aethanayaw and numerous other localities in Burma. The broadcast was recorded by The Associated Press in New York.

Raid Japanese Positions
Washington, April 1—(AP)—American bombers and fighters raided Japanese positions on Kiska island in the Aleutians twice Tuesday and attacked Attu island once, the Navy reported today. One bomber was lost to anti-aircraft fire. Hits were scored and fires started in a raid on Munda on New Georgia island all planes returned safely.

No reports were available on why pay adjustments are being made by employers not covered by wage-hour laws or labor agreements. The order, as interpreted by the WMC, requires payment of time and one-half after 40 hours only by those so covered.

Spark Starts Danbury Fire

sparked from an acetylene torch used by a workman in a 10 car garage at the John W. Leah plant on White street, shortly before nine o'clock this morning was blamed by Fire Chief John H. McNamara, for a fire which caused damage amounting to several thousands of dollars. Three trucks in the garage were considerably damaged by the fire, as was the garage itself.

The workman, Fred Hodaborn was using the torch to cut a door way through a metal partition separating the Leahy garage from a building occupied by the Centerless Grinding Company, a defense production unit also operated by Mr. Leahy. At the time several oil trucks were in the garage and according to Fire Chief McNamara a spark from the torch fell through the air and landed in one of the oil trucks causing the fire which spread so rapidly that within a few minutes the entire building was in flames.

A railroad employe from Middletown, N. Y., whose identity was not learned, was standing in the railroad yards which adjoin the plant, saw the blaze, and halted an approaching freight train which would have blocked the fire apparatus from reaching the scene and sounded an alarm from a nearby box.

When firemen reached the scene the flames were spreading into the defense plant, and Chief McNamara had his men concentrate their efforts in halting the blaze at this point. After thirty minutes, by using several lines of hose the blaze was brought under control.

Chief McNamara praised the quick-thinking of the railroad employe stating, "that had there been the slightest delay in apparatus reaching the scene, the entire plant may have been destroyed."
