### Japanese Aircraft Attack Milne Bay; Warning Is Given

Pacific will be won or lost by the proper application of air and ground forces.

MacArthur's statement came during a lull in the new Japanese aerial offensive, during which Allied airmen blasted two enemy ships in the New Guinea, probably sinking one of 10,000 tons and setting another of 8,000 tons afire.

"If we lose the air," the Allied commander declared, "Naval forces cannot say us. The first line of Allied defense in our bomber line."

MacArthur said, "The longer depends solely or perhaps even primarily upon Naval power, but upon air power operating from land bases based by ground troops."

A single Allied heavy bomber also swept in to drop bombs on the runway of the Japanese air field at Finschhafen, north of Lae.

Curtin Amplifies Warning by Blamey Melbourne, Australia, April 14.—Prime Minister John Curtin today amplified a warning by Gen. Sir Thomas Blamey, Australian commander of Allied ground forces in the Southwest Pacific, that Japan had massed 200,000 first-line troops on the approaches to New Guinea, and might be expected to launch an offensive at any time.

MacArthur appeared to back Blamey's conclusions, but said that a "primary thrust to Australia does not require a great initial concentration of Naval striking power. It requires rather a sufficient concentration of land-based aviation."

### German Morale Will Decide Fight Length

Three factors militate against any rapid ending of current campaign in Tunisia.

By Wes Gallagher  
Allied Headquarters in North Africa, April 13.—Whether Field Marshal Rommel can turn his Bizerte-Tunis bridgehead into a seaworthy or a Stalingrad appeared today to depend on a military intangible—the morale of his troops.

Despite the smashing victories of the British Eighth Army and the advance of American First Army troops, these factors militate against any rapid ending of the Tunisian campaign:

(1) Although approximately 25,000 prisoners have been captured since the March line was breached, their proportion of about 8-to-1 "taken" leaves the battle-trained Africa Corps still intact and all accounts truculent.

(2) The indication that the Nazis are attempting a "Dunkerg" for any of their troops and apparently they plan to fight to the last in the Bizerte-Tunis campaign.

(3) It is considered certain that Von Arnim has spent part of winter during perimeter defense of the Tunisian bridgehead into a winter of mine and tank traps.

The Germans are now falling back to a natural main defense line running in a rough semi-circle from Enfidaville northward toward the Mjez-el-Bab sector and thence to the Mediterranean at Cape Serrat. Most military observers agree, however, that the Allies have the strength to breach any such defenses, and that the time required depends largely on the morale of the defending German troops.

Feasible Force  
About two months ago it was estimated that the Germans and Italians had about 170,000 troops in Tunisia. Even considering the large losses sustained in recent fighting, they are certain still to have more than 100,000 in the small Tunisian bridgehead, which is a formidable force with such a small area to defend.

That Hitler has ordered Tunisia held as long as possible is indicated by the terrific losses the Germans have been taking in trying to supply their troops by air without success.

No Attempt to Withdraw  
There has been no attempt to withdraw any troops from Tunisia, according to authoritative sources. Any such attempt is certain to be welcomed by the Royal Navy which is probing the Mediterranean looking for such an opportunity while American R. A. F. control of the air would prevent any attempt at wholesale evacuation into a comparable Axis troops.

It is also believed that Mussolini is unwilling to risk his precious fleet to help get German out of Tunisia when he soon may need it to protect the homeland.

Most observers believe the German general staff has given orders to the Africa Corps to fight as long as possible, but it is considered interesting whether Rommel—one of the most skillful German generals who stay with his troops to the end or tie to Sicily to conduct the defense of Italy.

German propaganda made much of President Roosevelt's order to General MacArthur to leave Bataan and defend Australia a year ago.

While the German defense concentrated as they are, making for excellent ground defense, the viewpoint is that this is working against them in the air.

Virtually Control Air  
The Allies now have virtually complete control of the air. The Luftwaffe has been squeezed into a small number of fields and the Allied policy is to knock out airfields with methodical and unceasing bombing day and night.

The Germans have been maintaining some air protection despite attacks on their fields by flying in new planes and gasoline each morning, but during the past two weeks they have lost 318 planes and a total of 1,233 planes since the campaign started. These

### Objector Test Case Argued

Supreme Court Hearing First Case of Type For Present Conflict.

Washington, April 14.—A person seeking exemption from military service as a conscientious objector must report for induction when called if his claim has been denied by a draft board, came before the Supreme Court today for argument.

The first conscientious objector case argued before the tribunal since the present war started. It involves Whitney Bowles of Newfoundland, N. J., sentenced to three years imprisonment for not answering an induction call.

Must Appear for Induction  
Wendell Borge, assistant attorney general, contends in his brief that such a registrant must appear for induction and then, if for some physical examination, might seek a writ of habeas corpus to challenge the board's refusal to classify him as a conscientious objector.

Clarence C. Frankel, New York attorney for Bowles, asserts his client should have been permitted to challenge the board's ruling as unfair in the Federal district for New Jersey.

Submissor to induction, he said, "not only requires a person conscientious scruples to violate his conscience, but also submits him to the determination of the question of his exemption by the military authorities."

Borge said that "the selective service act shows that Congress was not legislating against conscientious objectors."

"It does not show," he added, "that Congress intended to protect conscientious objectors by providing for a Federal Circuit court of appeals to review the board's ruling at an induction station."

### To Check Cars On Highways

#### Inspectors Soon to Be Assigned to Posts in Behalf of Safety.

Hartford, April 14.—Motor Vehicle Department inspectors will soon be stationed at selected traffic distribution points around the state to check the mechanical condition of Connecticut registered cars in general, according to a statement issued today by Commissioner of Motor Vehicles John T. McCarthy, who emphasized that the action is being taken in behalf of public safety and car conservation.

"From personal observations of representatives of this department," states Commissioner McCarthy, "supplemented by advice from local police and complaints filed by citizens, it seems obvious that an increasing number of motor vehicles continue in use after having been involved in traffic conflict which caused car damage that was not properly repaired.

**To Check for Other Damage**  
"While a motor car with dented fenders and body damage is not necessarily a defective vehicle, our contention that any car or truck so involved should be checked to ensure that no substantial damage to frame and essential running gear, weakening its safety features, resulted.

"We are not satisfied with Connecticut's traffic accident record for 1942 and feel that the accident rate of 481.5 conflicts per 100 million miles of motor travel is too high, considering current events. While this rate is slightly lower than for 1941, it is higher than for 1940 when our country's welfare did not demand the same scrupulous care and consideration for man power and property.

"We have had several cases recently of car occupants being overcome through seepage of carbon monoxide fumes into vehicles. Two bus cases, affecting public transportation vehicles, were reported within the past two weeks. In another case, three occupants of a Connecticut registered motor vehicle were overcome in Massachusetts, where they were visiting, and the driver died. Such cases result from defective exhaust pipes and are needless.

**Out of State Cars**  
"We will, while giving traffic flow a general check, also have an opportunity to inspect car registrations. While our men will not interfere with the use of Connecticut highways by out-of-state cars bringing workers to and from their homes, we expect to apprehend a number of vehicles whose owners have been residents of Connecticut according to our laws and should have registered their vehicles with us as of March 1. We are fully conscious of the reciprocal arrangements with other states and will observe the same with care but we propose to see that cases should be registered here are so reported.

"This is not a special campaign. It is an activity which the department has been trying to carry on, as time and personnel permitted, since the elimination of the periodic inspection of motor vehicles. We simply propose now to step up the activity and in acquainting the Connecticut press with the facts give the general motoring public a warning. Efforts will be made not to interfere with traffic movement so as to cause unnecessary inconvenience but, during the spring and summer months ahead, uniformed motor vehicle inspectors will be out in the field, and check parts of the states performing duties which we believe will enhance public safety and impress more motor vehicle owners with the fact that they should 'care for their car for their country.'

# Items of Interest to Local Women Shopping with Judy

## In Defense of Vegetables

Being busy with war activities may be an ill wind that benefits vegetables. Too many of us have always cooked vegetables toasting for their good or for our own good. Vegetables that are over cooked look worn out, taste lifeless, and do not have the food value we should get from them.

We don't have to throw food into the garbage can to be wasteful. We can be wasteful by over cooking our foods. Now, since time is such a factor in most of our lives, let's not waste it by over cooking our vegetables. Cook them until they are just tender, and still have some individuality—no longer.

Here is another timesaver and it is a help in conserving vitamins and minerals. Leave the skins on vegetables when cooking them. Skins act as natural protectors. Besides Irish and sweet potatoes, it is possible to cook carrots, parsnips, beets, and summer squash with skins on. Vegetables should be cooked in as little water as possible because, unfortunately, some vitamins and minerals are soluble in water. To lessen the necessary cooking time, have the water boiling before putting the vegetables into the pan.

After they are cooked, if you pour the vegetable water down the sink drain, you are wasting precious minerals and vitamins. Use that water in homemade soups, gravies, jellied vegetable salads, or as a vegetable juice cocktail, or in combination with tomato juice.

Vegetables could be much more universally eaten with pleasure if they were cooked properly. To summarize, here are a few simple rules to follow:

1. Do not over cook. Cook only until tender.
2. Cook them in as little water as possible.
3. Have water boiling before the vegetables are added.
4. Cook with skins on when possible.
5. Do not use soda when cooking vegetables; it destroys vitamins.
6. Vegetable water may be used in soups, gravies, stews, jellied salads, on vegetables, or as a beverage.
7. Help to fight food waste in the home by saving the food value of vegetables.

## Limas for Protein

Limas are rich in protein, have an abundance of iron—in fact, three times as much as spinach—and are well stored with the vitamins B1 and G. They also contain the valuable minerals, phosphorus and calcium.

**Limas Escalloped**  
2 cups cooked, dried limas  
1-2 teaspoon salt  
1-8 teaspoon pepper  
Dash of paprika  
1 cup milk  
Fine bread crumbs  
1 tablespoon butter  
1-2 cup grated cheese, if desired.

Soak limas in cold water 4 to 6 hours. Cook in same water 30 to 40 minutes, or until tender. Put the limas in a buttered baking dish; add seasonings; pour over the milk; sprinkle top with fine bread crumbs and dot with bits of butter. Then bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees F.) until the crumbs are brown—about 20 minutes. If desired, grated cheese may be sprinkled over the limas before adding bread crumbs.
