Judgment for High Stakes

The note of warning from the Pacific front has become strident enough to deserve attention. There is no reason to doubt the facts of Australia's General Blamey when he states that the Japanese have now concentrated 200,000 troops in an arc north of Australia, with planes to match, and with these planes down by better pilots than were encountered for some time in this area.

The fact that the last few days have seen large-scale Japanese raids on Guadalcanal, Port Moresby, and other points also speaks for itself. The Japs are much stronger in this area than they were.

Nor is there any doubt of the fact that Japan, free from serious trouble on other fronts, is perfectly at liberty to reinforce this area. The fact is that Japan is not currently being challenged by the United Nations. True, the Japs are planning the next steps in this area. There are two possibilities. One is that, as feared by Australian sources, Japan is planning an actual invasion of Australia, in a force large enough to guarantee at least some temporary success.

The other possibility is that Japan is simply organizing an aggressive defense, trying to make sure that General MacArthur has no more successes in pushing out from Australia.

Secretary Knox, sitting in Washington, and calmly appraising the fact that the Japs seem to have no slight apprehensions of carrying this force on an invasion task, seems to think that aggressive defense is the Japanese purpose.

General Blamey, General MacArthur, and those who have front-line responsibility for Australia's safety are not able to take a calm view of the situation. And, as a matter of fact, their ambition is the same no matter what it may be. They are planning that they want the men and places not only to defeat the Japs if the Japs move forward, but to go forward themselves and blast the Japs from this threatening position.

They want to be able to lick this force, whether it is in defense of Australia, or in their own offensive against Japan. Back to Washington again, the problem there, at the moment at least, seems to be to give the main part of our activity priority. Even if it means running a risk in other fields.
