





# Lenten Meditation By Rev, Earl H. Furgeson tor North Methodist Church

t is commonly claimed, especthose who are more imed with the theological than the ethical aspects of Christianity. that the emphasis of Easter is to be laid upon the hope or the proof of immortality. The earliest Christiana however, would earliest Christiana however, would have been perplexed by this mod-orn claim despite the fact that this claim became a part of Christian-ity very early. The notion of the immortality of the individual soul came to Christianity from Greek speculation. If differs, for ex-ample from Paul's notion of the resurrection of the dead.
