A fistula can only come from continued neglect of rectal disorders which could have casily been remedied in their in-cipiency. In the treatment of hemorrhoids it is important to adopt the use of the enema, and the rectum should be thoroughly, washed once or twice a day with warm water. Bad eating habits should be changed to good ones. The food supply must be cut to the mini-






