



Mulcahy is a little afraid to e temate the savings of Connecticut residents through the OPA price ceiling on used mechanical re-frigerators, but on the basis of the telephone calls he has been receiving at his office each day be-lieves that in Hartford alone the savings have amounted to an average of \$3,000 s day, or a week-"Of course, that's only on used mechanical refrigerators," he points out "I'm not counting other

appliances, such as used washing machines, which also have a definite dollars and cents ceiling price, not only for dealer transac-tions, but for transactions between

private parties."

25 Phone Calls Daily

Mulcahy says that he receives ar average of 25 phone calls a day from housewives who have thought, after paying anywhere from \$100 to \$250 for used refrigerators, that the OPA might have some regulation—or something—about it.

"An overcharge of \$150 on a 12-year-old refrigerator is not unusual, not until this week, at any rate," he added. "But in every rate," he added. "But in every case, when I pointed out the legal selling price of the machine, the seller has refunded the difference. Generally, the seller as well as the buyer has been unaware that such charges constitute clear vi lations of the price control act."
