

Continue Rush To Pay Taxes

This is final day for second installment; mail reaching peak.

Hartford, June 15.—The quarterly rush to pay income taxes continued in full swing today, the final day to settle with Uncle Sam on the second installment of the 1942 tax bill despite the pay-as-you-go system beginning July 1.

Though many taxpayers put off an argument on the theory that the 75 per cent forgiveness in the new law exempted them from payment of the June 15 installment, officials of the Internal Revenue Bureau said the fact that the second quarterly payment is due now is generally understood.

With 500,000 bills mailed from the office for the entire state, many checks of small containing money orders and stamps are being piloted in the offices here. Since other collection offices do not accept cash payments, the mail is running better than ever with out of town payments by check and money order.

No Big Rush Today

A small crowd of taxpayers waited for the office to open at 8:30 this morning but officials said the rush would soon subside.
