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# Post-War Jobs Plan Is Put in Operation

**State Reemployment Program Starts Working With Returning Ex-Service Men.**

Hartford, July 14.—The state of Connecticut today is placing in operation a post-war re-employment plan, which starts working with the ex-service men now returning to civil life.

The plan does three things. One, it tells the men where to look for jobs and get aptitude tests if needed; two, makes job or educational training available to those needing it; three, works with industry, labor and established agencies to find jobs.

**Foremost Placement Problem**

The Connecticut planners believe this kind of job placement will be the foremost place problem of the United States, that it eventually will take in not only soldiers, but persons displaced from war work. A total of 10,000,000 men will be in the total running possibly well above 20,000,000. The plan is broad enough for national use, but starts on a purely local level in Hartford and other Connecticut cities.

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# All Printing Faces Probe

**Zeller Broadens His Inquiry to Include All State Contracts Let.**

Hartford, July 14.—(AP)—Criticism of the printing contract awarded during the term of his predecessor was broadened by Comptroller Fred R. Zeller last night into an investigation of all state printing contracts let during that period.

"The printing of public documents has been loosely handled by the comptroller's office in the past two years," Zeller charged, saying that printing costs under the Democratic administration of Governor John M. Dowd "have been excessive."

At his home in Killingly, Zeller said that all records on which he might base a survey are in Zeller's possession. Every bid submitted during this term was on a non-competitive basis, he said, and while he is a contractor "we always ended well within our appropriation."

The contract which Zeller criticized yesterday was one awarded to T. F. Eady and Company by the State Milk Producers' Association for printing 2,800,000 pages of bulletins for the University of Connecticut Extension Service. Because the company found engraving costs were greater than estimated, Zeller declared, the price of the contract was increased by the company's original low bid of \$22,221.

Dowd replied that he did not wish to comment on the Eady contract without referring to records.

But he said, "particularly in University of Connecticut contracts, it often happened that the University called for the printing of several times the number of bulletins originally asked for."

**Fail to File Reports**

Hartford, July 14.—(AP)—Many firms have failed to file lobbying reports although the deadline is less than a week away, the state's attorney's office announced yesterday.

Around 30 per cent of the cases filed returned from North Africa were so-called mental cases, they were said.

# Love Theft Case Upset

**Supreme Court Asserts Judge 'Unsworn Witness to Material Facts.'**

Hartford, July 14.—(AP)—The Supreme Court today held that a judge who testifies in a case in which he is a party is not an unsworn witness to material facts.

"In effect the trial court, as a basis for these findings, made of himself a witness, and in making them availed himself of his personal knowledge," he became an unsworn witness to material facts without the defendant having any opportunity to cross-examine or to offer countervailing evidence or to know upon what evidence declaration would be made."

Recalling that, in earlier decisions, it had held that "the trial's right to take into account its observation of the demeanor of witnesses is limited to the observation of such genuine and spontaneous reactions by them in the courtroom as bear upon the credibility to be accorded to their testimony given under oath," it added: "It is impossible to reach any conclusion other than that the judge constituted a material factor in the decision of the issues by the trial court, and in making them into consideration it was in error."

**No Trace of Girl Reporter**

New Haven, July 14.—(AP)—A week's search has failed to produce any trace of Rose Marie Brancato, the 27-year-old New Haven Journal-Courier reporter who vanished last Monday night, police said yesterday.

Kovacs married Lillian Stentis in December, 1937, when he was 25 and she 18 and they had one child, a boy.

The case was tried in New Haven in June, 1942, and at the trial Kovacs testified that his wife had threatened to drown her if she returned to him.

# Heavy Labor Men Scarce

**No Replacements Available in State for Vigorous Manual Work.**

Hartford, July 14.—(AP)—Widespread shortages of male labor in the manufacturing and construction industries were indicated in the monthly report of the Connecticut Employment Service released today.

Reports from the 18 field offices of the Employment Service indicated that, although women were doing a remarkable job in production jobs, there had been little or no replacement of men engaged in vigorous manual work requiring heavy lifting with the result that an acute shortage of manual workers now exists.

Labor stabilization agreements have effectively cut down turnover and job shopping, it was also reported, although Hartford, acting under the provisions of a temporary interim plan, reported little change in this situation. A labor stabilization committee has already been organized in Hartford, and it is expected that an agreement will be effective in this area soon.

**Teachers, Students Indefinite**

Other industrial developments during the past month included an influx of school teachers for summer school and some summer labor stringencies by the use of students, although registration from the past month was not unusual because many students had already obtained work. An increasing use of part-time workers by industry and the continued release of men by women were also noted.

Some small layoffs occurred in isolated areas due to the expiration of contracts and for other reasons, but no widespread layoffs were reported. An instance quickly absorbed by other factors.

In general, the industrial picture for the past month was one of continued production with some greater labor stability than usual, and with employers generally meeting the problem of labor supply in a realistic and cooperative manner.

**Hartford Area**

Industrial activity in the Hartford area during the past month had a continued shortage of all types of workers. Since there has been a noticeable drop in the migration of workers from other areas to this city, the program were developed elsewhere, job placement and expansion needs must necessarily come from the local part, part from among persons in the Hartford area who are presently not in the active labor market or who are engaged in less essential activities.

Employers report that the present Interim Stabilization Program has made little change in the turnover rate. This differs from other parts of the state, like Bridgeport and Waterbury where Stabilization Agreements have markedly reduced turnover.

Employers are accepting more and more part-time workers. In fact, two large firms have set up a 4-hour shift which fills the gap between the two regular labor shifts to complete the "round the clock" schedule. School teachers are being used more extensively this year than last. Thus far the Employment Service has placed 50 teachers at work.

There has been a definite tapering off of construction work in this area with little anticipation of renewal of this type of activity in the immediate future.

Though women will necessarily have to fill many jobs now open that hitherto have always been done by men, there is still a need of men for the heavy laboring operations that are definitely unsuitable for women. There is a critical need for men to fill these unskilled but nevertheless heavy jobs.

# Allows More Bus Mileage

**Conference Indicates Some Relief for Harassed Bus-Riders.**

Hartford, July 14.—(AP)—Some relief for Connecticut's harassed bus-riders was indicated by developments at the Public Utilities Commission conference with state and Federal officials yesterday.

Additional bus mileage will be permitted by the O.P.A. if it is announced, and the governor is preparing to let by a bill which would increase the number of standing room passengers on standing room.

Home A. Johnson, regional head of the O.P.A., said that increases in bus mileage will be permitted in most of the state's large cities, thus restoring largely the 30 per cent cut which took effect late in May.

Meanwhile, the P.U.C. plans to survey all buses in the state to determine the standing room capacity of each, keeping in mind the safety factor. Buses may be equipped with special bars to keep strapangers from standing near the driver.

Among the lines for which increased service were granted by the O.P.A. are the Oak Street line in New Britain, the CRAI line in Bridgeport, Waterbury, Ansonia and Derby; the Hartford-Waterbury line; the Hartford-Windham line; the Bridgeport Central avenue line; the New Haven and Shore Line Railway line; and the New London and Niantic Coach line.

"We considered it necessary for essential transportation in the state is engaged in essential war production," he explained.

The plan, submitted by C. Gilbert Collingwood, would have permitted motorists to use their "A" coupons as they wished, but varied the value of the coupons with the available supply of gasoline.

"With the situation as critical as it is and likely to remain for some time, we do not believe Mr. Collingwood's suggestion can be adopted," said a letter from John A. Richards, chief of the O.P.A.'s gasoline section, which Mrs. Luce sent to Collingwood.

"Unfortunately, even with the most vigorous enforcement certain quantities of gasoline find their way into illegal channels and the mere display of an 'A' sticker does not necessarily mean that the operator is using gasoline strictly within the limit of his basic allowance."
