

Order Ahead For Canning Housewives Asked To See Their Grocers To Get Best Dates.

Hartford, July 29.—The Connecticut food distribution industry, through its advisory committee to the State War Council, suggested today that housewives who are canning vegetables and fruits place orders with their grocers.

Some of the most important crops for home canning, especially the native tomato crop, the committee pointed out, will be on the market soon, and retail men anticipate a continued heavy demand to produce.

Ordering ahead will insure that the customer gets the produce at the amount she wants and at the time she wants it, the committee said.

Known Market Peaks
The retail tradesman also is in a position, the committee added, to advise the housewife on approaching market peaks when supplies will be available in largest quantities and the price can be expected to be lowest.

The committee, representing growers as well as wholesale and retail produce handlers, with Arthur H. Gosselin of New Haven as chairman, made these recommendations in conference with War Council Administrator Harold F. Woodcock and Food Administrator Henry H. Mosle. Members reported that demand for produce remains equipment and produce.

creased ground defenses and

Half Dozen Bombers Destroyed
Twenty-eight bombers were re-
ported missing. A half dozen en-
emy planes were destroyed on
other raids, the Air Ministry
said.

A massive attack stirred
speculation that Hamburg is be-
ing made the subject of an Allied
experiment to determine whether
a city that large can be paral-
yzed completely from the air.

Swiss Bombers
In This Connection it was noted
that lengthening nights will bring
Berlin itself within the range of
heavy day and night bombing by
October or November.

Scared by Seven Raids
Hamburg with her million in-
habitants has been scared by five
British night raids since Saturday,
and flames and smoke from the struc-
tures that have served her since suc-
cessive raids.

Last night's attack was the
10th of the war carried out on
that city by the R. A. F. but this
week's concentrated assault on the
city apparently was aimed at
blowing it out of the map.

American medium bombers
swept out at daybreak today to
continue the round-the-clock ar-
ried territory in the war's great-
est offensive by blasting the Axis
German airfields at Weens-
drecht in Holland this morning.

Swift British Mosquito planes
hit at other targets in Germany
during the night, but the Air Home
Security Ministry said that damage
and no casualties resulted.
