### Sees Another Balance As Town's Year Ends

Even With Decreased Tax Rate Treasurer Waddell Expects at Least \$90,000.

With less than two weeks to go in the present town year, Treasurer Waddell was informed last night that there remained unexpended \$100,000.15 in the list of appropriations made by the town at the annual town meeting last October and at the adjourned meeting in March.

Commenting on the town's financial condition, Waddell, town treasurer, said that the \$100,000 on hand on August 15 with all bills against the town paid and a balance of \$27,000 less than was on hand when the year closed last year, it must be taken into consideration that when the tax was raised in March it was made at 20 mills, and that the town's previous year's financial figures of money received by the tax collector for taxes were 100 percent of the tax but because the tax rate was reduced this year the amount of money collected would not be 100 percent of the tax but because of the reduction of the tax rate, the amount of money collected would be less than 100 percent of the tax.

The work that is now being done is to make a final check of the present history of the town's financial condition, which will be made up at the town meeting in October. It is expected that the town will have a surplus of money next year.
