### Native Patients Bring Friends to Live Under Beds in Navy Hospital

By Sgt. Milburn McCarthy, Jr., Marine Corps (Special to NEA Service)

Somewhere in the South Pacific, on this island, is one of Uncle Sam's strangest institutions. It is a hospital that furnishes neither food nor beds to its patients. And almost every time the hospital takes a new patient, it gets two or more new inmates.

It is a 125-bed establishment run by the U. S. Navy. Although it frequently handles Navy and Marine cases, its main work is with the natives.

What makes the hospital different is the ever-present "friends." When a new patient arrives he is attended by at least one, sometimes five or six. They move in with all the essentials of everyday living—breadfruit and other native foodstuffs; a kerosene burner or two to cook with; and plenty of mats, linens, and sacks of cloths. They set up housekeeping on the floor by the patient's bed.

During the day there is no limit to the number who may stay with a patient. But at night, only one man, he, or she, simply tucks under the patient's bed and sleeps there.

Exercise Special Care. Salmonella Newport organisms are found in the urine of animals, especially dogs, and Dr. Moore states that persons eating garden produce, such as lettuce, spinach and other leafy plants exposed to dogs should exercise special care in the cleaning of such produce before using, especially if they are not to be cooked. The disease is especially virulent in children and enters in human beings.

We have been told, by the Badoglio dictatorship in Italy, that "unconditional" surrender would be something unduly harsh for the Italian nation to accept. It prefers, therefore, to make a gesture of continuing in the war, presumably hoping to win, by the sacrifice of more Italian, and more Allied lives, more "reasonable" terms. It is difficult to see how harder fighting, if the Italians do persist in it, is going to make us softer our terms.

But what does "unconditional surrender" mean, that it is so severe? Wherein lies its harshness? Why is it not a "peace with honor," as the Badoglio government claims it wants?

The harshness of "unconditional surrender" lies principally in the fact that it involves complete admission on the part of our enemy that it has been defeated; in this war. And that, as well, at the end of the harness. Even Badoglio must know that, once Italy has surrendered, our treatment of Italy would be, to take a realistic comparison, something much less severe and much more just than Germany's treatment of Italy has been.
