had ended and when that key town
was taken, the German hopes of
holding the Mt. Etna line were
broken.

However, he said, once the
American and British assault di-
visions landed on the beaches in
the original amphibious campaign,
and began driving toward their
first objectives in the mountains,
the German line had broken and
the battle had been won.

The crucial point, he continued,
was during the first 48 hours
when the German Hermann Goer-
ring and 15th Airborne division
launched tank-supported attacks
against the Americans around
Messina.

When the Yanks broke through
the assault, Italian resistance
immediately began to collapse al-
though there were several heavy
engagements before the general
advance without hindrance.
