The largest single real estate mortgage floated in this town for building construction was effected today in New York by Jiggs Williams & Hyde, representing the Manchester Trust Company in a conference with the Underwriter's Trust Company of New York, for the construction of the Manchester Garden Apartments on the former Olcott estate, St. James street and Forest street.

The amount of the loan is \$540,000.

Bank Acts as Agent  
The mortgage will be added to the Buffalo, N. Y. Savings Bank and will be insured by the Federal Home Administration. The Manchester Trust Company acts as agent in the deal for the Buffalo Savings Bank and will collect the rents from the investment holdings following completion of the project.

18 Months of Planning  
The completion of the financing of the Garden Apartment group closes more than 18 months of planning and surveying, changing of plans and thwarting of plans of Robert Raymond, the original projector of the apartment group. Opposition to the construction of the apartment house group was brought by members of adjacent Cheney families and the Zoning Board of Appeals, repeatedly turned down Raymond's application for a permit to proceed with financing his project.

Is Finally Approved  
However, the Zoning Board finally approved the project with limitations of the original plan, and Raymond brought in David Rose of New York, a well known Manhattan builder, who went ahead with the planning of the project to build the apartments to house 100 families.

Construction is proceeding satisfactorily since final details regarding water and sewer construction were approved and foundation for several of the brick apartments have already been poured.

**Favor World Peace Setup**  
Republicans Also Propose End to Control Of Lives of Civilians.

MacInnis Island, Mich., Sept. 8.—A 1,500-word "MacInnis charter" calling for American participation in an organization of sovereign nations to halt aggression as well as an end to control of American civilian life by "bureaucratic decrees" had the approval today of a large segment of the Republican party.

A two-pronged foreign and domestic statement of principles was adopted unanimously at an hour's concluding session yesterday of the Republican Post-War Advisory Council composed of 24 state governors, national legislators and other party leaders.

Called to Draw Basic Ideas  
The two-day "little convention" of the G. O. P. was called to draw some basic ideas to be turned over to the party's 1944 platform builders. All the leading figures here expressed the hope, however, that post-war foreign policy would not be made a partisan issue in the next presidential campaign.

So broad was the peace-peace proposal that leaders of all factions accepted it with little, if any, reservation.

It provides not only for "responsible participation" by this country in a post-war organization to maintain permanent peace with "organized justice" in a free world, but for "disarmament and reorganization" of the Axis armed forces and maintenance of "trained and well-equipped armed forces at home."

The 1,000 word domestic program report was submitted by committee headed by Senator Taft of Ohio.

Federal Bureau Rapped  
It said the number of Federal civilian employees has grown 300 per cent to a total of more than 3,000,000 and that the number of minority members, serving notice of their resignation, has grown to a point where it would be necessary to raise individual taxes in 1943 or 1944. He said the agreement was made during consideration of the pay-as-you-go bill.

"Highest Per Capita Tax"  
Asserting that the American people today "pay the highest per capita tax in the world," Knutson said there would be no increase in individual taxes "as far as I am concerned." He conceded, however, that "war needs may drive us to it."

Chairman Doughton (D., N. C.), in reporting that he had not been unanimous with a "disapproval" of the Treasury's recommendation for obtaining new taxes, declared that "there seems to be a great deal of confusion as to what might be presented."

**Maps Plans For Raising New Levies**  
House Ways and Means Committee Calls Executive Huddle to Fix Ability to Pay.

Washington, Sept. 8.—(AP)—Wanted: \$12,000,000,000.

With that staggering sum as its challenge, the House Ways and Means committee called an executive huddle today to map plans for unearthing John Taxpayer's ability to meet more and more of the cost out of current income.

Most of the session probably will be devoted to setting the procedure for public hearings on a new revenue bill and on a more immediate review of the war contract financing bill, which permits the government to recoup "excessive" profits.

But, there were indications that the committee also might:

1. Request the Treasury and its tax experts to submit recommendations on how to obtain the \$12,000,000,000 in new revenue.
2. Request the Treasury to begin the tax hearings are due to begin, including the deadline for their submission.
3. May Get Vinson's Views  
Invite Fred M. Vinson, director of economic stabilization, to furnish his views on the revenue problem, and possibly work with the committee in an advisory capacity.
4. Set up the canvas for a general picture of the nation's economic status, and answers to such questions as: How many jobs are there? How many more jobs are needed? Where can economies be effected? Where can government services be cut?
5. Meanwhile, Representative Knutson (R., Minn.), a ranking minority member, served notice that he would remind his committee colleagues of a "gentleman's agreement" not to raise individual taxes in 1943 or 1944. He said the agreement was made during consideration of the pay-as-you-go bill.

**Special Election Postponed**

Hartford, Sept. 8.—The Putnam Phalanx, historic military organization whose recent election officers were declared void by the Superior court which found it unconstitutional, has been placed in shape and Australian troops are streaming in by air transport to reinforce paratroopers moving on Lae from the rear.

Lae has two airbases, Salamaua, 18 miles southeast, and All three are in danger of seizure as a consequence of an encirclement which has trapped Japanese Army estimated at 20,000 men.

Insafe To Use Airstrips  
All three no longer can be used by the enemy. Allied bombers, captured by fighters, have made it unsafe for the Japanese to use airstrips at Pimakin, Madang, Nubia, Alexishafen and airbases 330 miles above Salamaua around Wauk.

Slowly, after many weeks, Americans and Australians are fighting on the very edges of the Salamaua airbase. In contrast, the development of Lae and its two airbases is proceeding rapidly.

Australians who went ashore Saturday under protection of American warships have destroyed a Japanese force at a plantation 10 miles northeast of Lae and now are near the mouth of the Bani river, only four miles from their objective.

While the paratroopers to the northwest joined with these Australians in supplying a pinners on Lae, Allied planes, virtually monopolizing the sky, have destroyed Japanese enemy bivouacs and supply dumps with 140 tons of bombs.

The Japanese Air Force, which weakly opposed the Australian landings from the Saturday—Monday, but never appeared as one or the biggest assemblages of planes ever employed in the South Pacific executed the paratroop operations Sunday—showed up Monday.

American fighters sped out over the Huon gulf to intercept 20 enemy medium bombers and 10 fighters. Two Japanese bombers and five fighters definitely were destroyed. Five other bombers and a fighter were believed shot down. The Americans lost one P-38.

Sen. Dannaher Speaker Here

Tells Members of Rotary Club of Routine of Bills in Senate.

Senator John Dannaher of Meriden, junior senator from Connecticut and a former Republican, was the guest speaker at the meeting of the Rotary Club last night at the Manchester Country Club. He chose to speak on procedure in the Senate, showing the procedure brought upon the members by committees by letters and telegrams from individuals and groups. He passed to read a collection of letters from women's organizations in this state, urging him to vote for this measure because they favored it, and from another group of women, stating that they were strongly opposed to the bill, asking him to vote accordingly.
