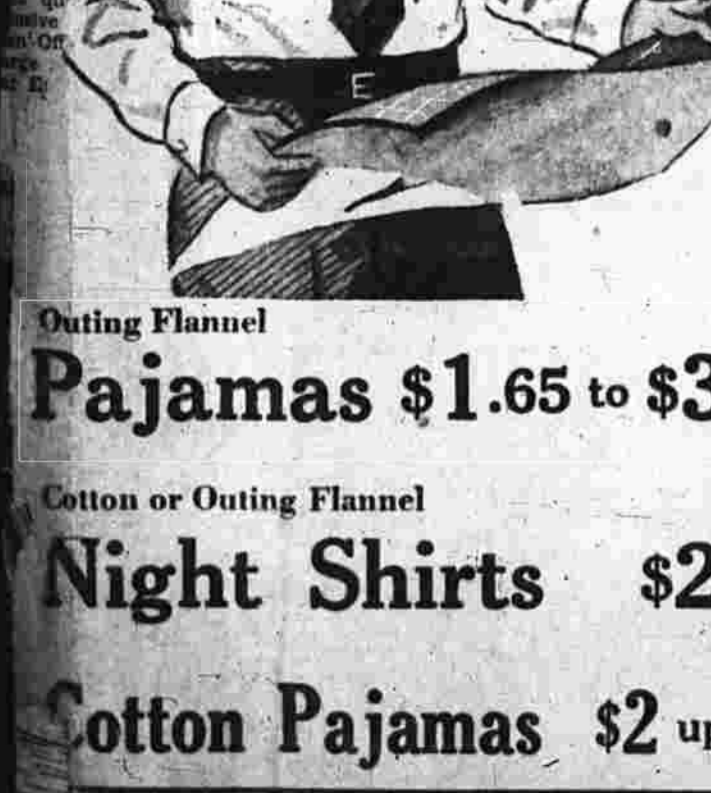

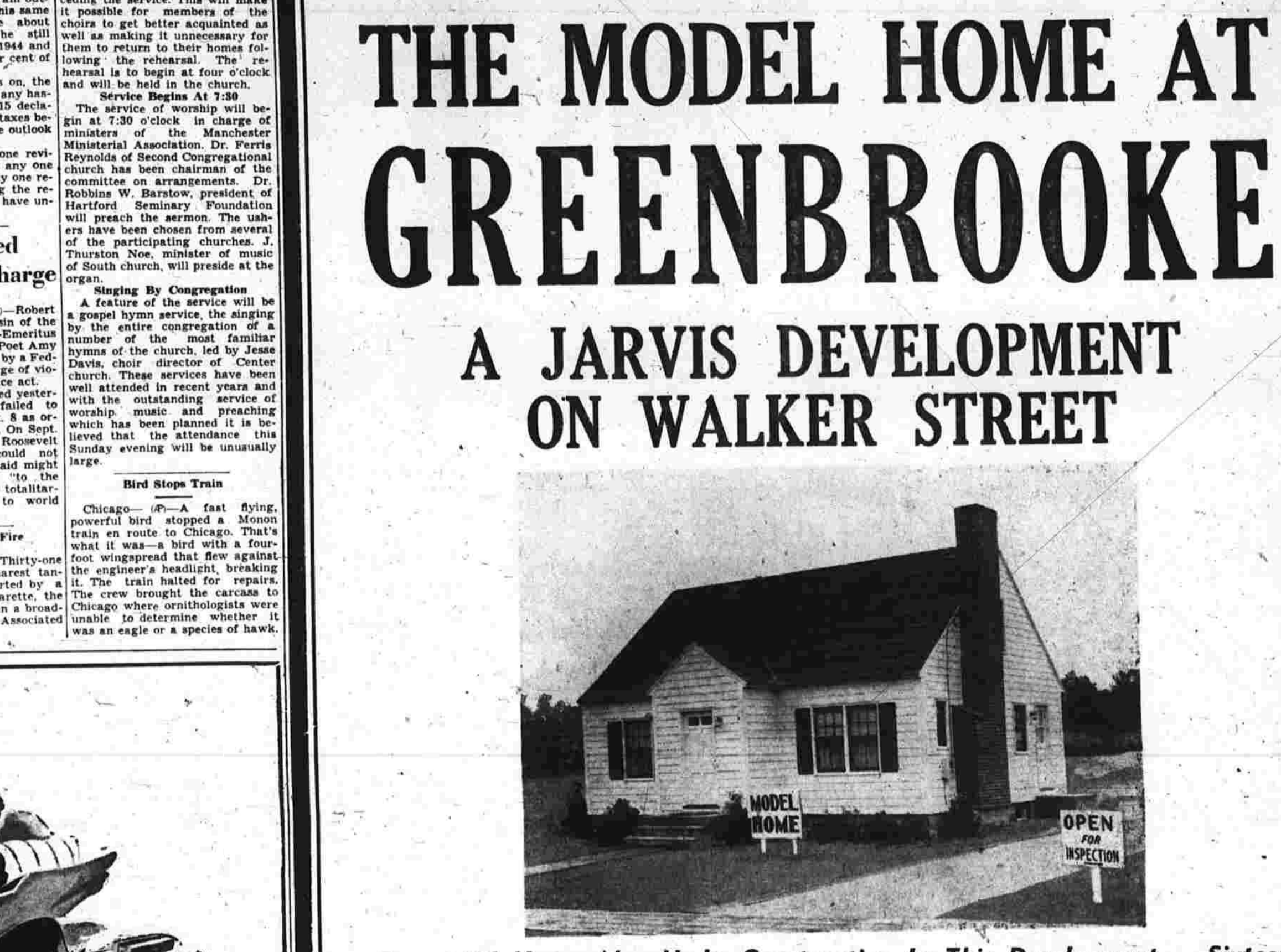

War Stern Competitor For Politics in State
Campaigns Actually Little Like Lusty Battles Of Old as 143 Towns Vote Monday.

By Carl J. Lattin
New Haven, Oct. 2.—(AP)—Politi-cians finding the war a stern competitor in Connecticut where most of the communities are now in the midst of what, through force of habit, are being called municipal election campaigns but actually bear little resemblance to the lusty scenes of old.
Although 143 of Connecticut's 168 communities will elect municipal officials Monday, the cam-paigns have bumped into an elec-tion that apparently is too im-pressed in turning out the goods of war, figuring out how many war bonds it can buy and keeping tabs on the many global battle-fronts to pay much attention to the fortunes of politics.

Little Interest in Bristol
Typical of the tough competi-tion politics is receiving from the war are reports out of Bristol, one of three cities where mayoralties will be at stake. "Very little inter-est shows here," one observer re-ported, while others said that "never in recent history have there been so quiet."
In Torrington, another city where the mayoralty will be the top prize, Republicans announced plans for a rally and dangled the prospect of a new city elec-torate—a member of Connecti-cutt's official family, Secretary of the State Frances Redde, as the speaker; a promise that all speeches would be short, and the announcement that doughnuts and cider would be served.
Sharing top billing with Bristol and Torrington in Monday's elec-tion will be Meriden, which has actually had been advised in rank just before news of his death became known in Washington. He died unaware of his promo-tion.

Two Veterans in Field
Newark and Torrington Demo-crats have two veterans in the field for mayor. Their nominees in Newark is Mayor Frank T. Stack, hat manufacturer, who is seeking his fifth consecutive two-year term.
Winner of the previous four years by a slim margin, ranging from 500 to 2,400 votes, Mayor Stack is opposed by Robert E. Oil-

Cross Given Dead Captain
Posthumous Award Made to Stamford Marine.

Washington, Oct. 2.—(AP)—Myles C. Fox, of Stamford, Conn., a cap-tain in the U. S. Marine Corps, has been awarded the Navy Cross, posthumously, for helping to stop the Japs from breaching Marine lines during the seizure of Tulagi, Solomon Islands.
Although fatally wounded, Cap-tain Fox kept up his defense. The Japs were repulsed and suffered heavy losses.
Captain Fox graduated from Williams College, and at the time of his enlistment he was assistant to the graduate manager of ath-letics at the school. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. James C. Fox, live at 42 Sea Beach drive, Stamford.
A presidential citation awarded with the medal reads:
"For extraordinary heroism while attached to Company E, First Marine Battalion, battalion, during the seizure of Tulagi, Solom-on Islands, on the night of Aug. 7-8, 1942."
When a hostile counter-attack threatened to penetrate the bat-talion line between E and B com-panies, First Lieutenant Fox, al-though mortally wounded, persis-tently directed the deployment of personnel to cover the gap. As a result of his great personal valor and skillful tactics, the enemy suf-fered heavy losses and their attack was repulsed.
"First Lieutenant Fox, by his dauntless devotion to duty, upheld the highest traditions of the United States Naval service. He gall-antly gave his life in the defense of his country."

Humitarian Aim of Commandments Is Key to a Better World Tomorrow

By William E. Gilroy, D.D.
The aim of the lessons of this last quarter of the year is "to help the student to interpret the Ten Commandments in the light of the teaching of Jesus and to apply them in personal life and in social relationships."
Such interpretation is necessary, for though moral principles and the rules governing good relationships in social life do not change, the conditions and the problems to which they may be applied do change, and the form and manner of their application must be adapted accordingly.
Sabbath observance, for instance, in a great modern city must be different in form, if not in spirit, from Sabbath observance in a small rural community, or in primitive conditions like those in which the Israelites were situated when the Commandments were given.
"To attempt to apply the same rule with identical results in a modern city would involve great hardship and suffering," an inter-pretation of the Commandments is designed to prevent.
The whole purpose of the Com-mandments was humanitarian, and this was the very foundation of prop-erty, justice and welfare.
We shall never have real peace, or a true democracy, until these principles are recognized and prac-ticed. It is futile to talk of a bet-ter tomorrow for the world unless men are going to be better them-selves first. Jesus saw this, and with His own life and blood He gave us a new and better way of life. He gave the Commandments positive expres-sion. It was not enough to refrain from doing certain things; the Com-mandments could be fulfilled
