Check on Gas Sales Begins

Drive Aimed to Stop Transfer of Unendorsed Ration Stamps.
Hartford, Oct. 12.—(AP)—Aiming to stop the transfer of unendorsed ration stamps, the Connecticut OPA today launched what it described as a "state wide drive against all service stations which continually fail to comply with this important detail of regulations."
The drive will be concentrated at "no one point," an enforcement division official said, indicating that the staff of investigators would fan out across the state in a dozen different directions.
Accounts to undergo scrutiny. It was revealed, however, that ration banking accounts of gasoline distributors would undergo particularly close scrutiny for evidence of "phony" registration numbers.
Explaining this phase of the investigation, Anthony F. Arpaia, state OPA director, said: "Irresponsible dealers who accept loose coupons without proper endorsement usually invent a registration number or take the number from a passing car and then endorse the coupon themselves. When they take these illegitimately accepted coupons over to their distributor they deposit them in his ration banking account."
"It is these accounts we intend to check. Whenever we find a phony number on a coupon and no endorsement at all, we will act quickly and with all the authority in our power."
Must Stamp Out Fractions.
"We must stamp out the acceptance of gasoline ration coupons as well as deliberate defiance of the regulations. Moreover, we must have full cooperation of all car owners in this matter. If even honest citizens carefully endorse his gasoline ration coupons as soon as they are issued to him, he will be doing a big part in stemming the leak of gasoline into the black market."
Stephen Knight, OPA enforcement attorney, asserted that "failure of gasoline station operators to insist on stamps being properly endorsed and not loose makes it easier for counterfeiters to do business."
Knight observed that "the presence of counterfeit stamps in a dealer's inventory is pretty good proof he is accepting loose and unendorsed stamps."

Montevideo, Oct. 12.—(AP)—Two Montevideo newspapers, La Mazona and El Pais, today quoted private telephone reports from Buenos Aires as saying that three members of the Argentine cabinet resigned yesterday.
They were said to be Jorge Balsa Martin, minister of justice; Brig. Gen. Emilio Araya, minister of justice and public education; and Vice Admiral Juan Galindez, minister of public works.
There had been many rumors of an impending cabinet shakeup in the past 10 days.

"It should be borne in mind that in addition to having the post manned at regular specified intervals, all observation posts are subject to an immediate call to duty at a twenty-four hour alert basis. In this case, it will be necessary that the Chief Observer reach the Observation Post in the shortest possible time. The method of achieving this will be discussed and arranged for by your Area Supervisor."

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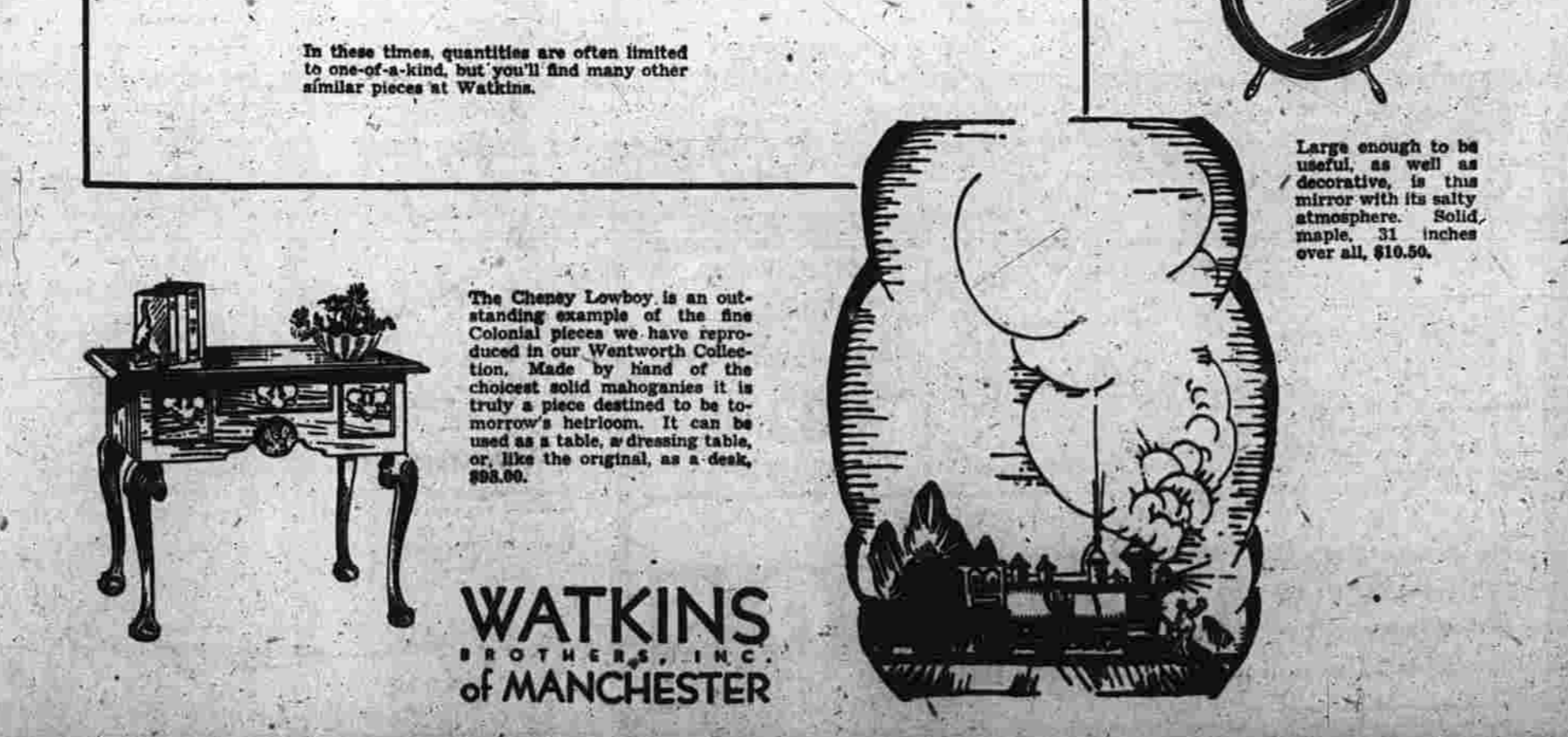

Against Giving 'Blank Check'

Maloney Opposes Committing Nation to Post-War Program Now.

Hartford, Oct. 13.—U. S. Senator Francis T. Maloney (D., Conn.) said in an informal talk yesterday that despite suggestions that Congress adopt a post-war resolution now, he was opposed to giving any "blank check" to post-war treaty makers.

"I am indeed in favor of international machinery to insure peace," he said to the State Managers club luncheon. "But I feel we should know what is in our allies' minds before we commit ourselves."

Have New Situation
"Everyone wants peace assured for all times, but on the occasion of this war, we have a new situation. Our peace plans, our post-war planning, must be concerned with all the world."

"We have got to concern ourselves with the coffee grower of Brazil, the vintner of France, the cattle raiser of Australia, the rice farmer of the East Indies. We realize that economic distress breeds war. We have got to be mindful of our neighbors across the sea."

"Too many people are impatient because Congress does not adopt this or that post-war resolution right away tomorrow."

Opposed to 'Blank Check'
"Yet no kind of international treaty will stand up if the 130 million people in this country do not subscribe to it. Proud as I am of our president's internationalism, I don't want our leaders to give any 'blank check' for subsequent peace treaties or alliances."

The senator also spoke against what is called "the so-called education bill," to grant Federal funds to states for educational purposes.

Asking how long it will be before "the government which controls the purse would begin to control education," he contended that centralized government control can result in leading "the minds of children into nationalism and family fanaticism."

Crippled Children In State Now 1,500

Hartford, Oct. 13.—Over fifteen hundred children under the care of the Division of Crippled Children during the year ended on June 30, including about four hundred and fifty new patients, according to a report submitted the year's activities of the Division and given in the latest issue of the Monthly Bulletin of the Department. Seven crippled children clinics are maintained in the State and 2,255 visits were made to the clinics during the year. Although actual figures are imponderable and have limited use when applied to children handicapped by physical or mental defects or in fact to any children, sick or healthy, they do show the extent of the services given to the crippled children of the State.

One hundred and seventy children were admitted to hospitals and received a total of over nine thousand days of care in hospitals. Thirty patients were admitted to convalescent homes and received a total of over four thousand days of care. The three children admitted to foster homes received a total of three hundred days of care there.

Warns on Using Bad Antifreeze

Hartford, Oct. 13.—John F. Maers, District Mgr., Hartford Office of Defense Transportation today cautioned operators of all kinds of motor vehicles against the use of harmful salt or oil preparations as radiator antifreeze. Quoting from a pamphlet on "Cooling System: Cleaning, Flushing, Rust Prevention and Antifreeze," prepared by the ODT by the Society of Automotive Engineers, Mr. Maers said:

"Oils, sugars and inorganic salt solutions are unsatisfactory for one reason or another. The principal objection to inorganic salt antifreeze materials (caustic or other chlorides, for example) are electrical conductivity and corrosive effects. Leakage of salt antifreeze solutions onto the ignition system parts will cause serious shorting of the electrical circuits. To date, no chemical treatment is known which will inhibit salt antifreezes against corrosion in the cooling system, even though they may produce satisfactory corrosion-resisting laboratory tests. Another objection reported on salt antifreezes is the possibility of crystal formation in the radiator, which would restrict circulation."

"Although the production of antifreeze solutions compounded with inorganic salts or petroleum distillates was stopped on January 20, 1943, such objectionable materials are still offered for sale in some localities. Mr. Maers further stated:

British Trying Body Armor

London, Oct. 13.—(AP)—Following a trail blazed by the United States Air Force, the R.A.F. was reported today to be experimenting with body armor for bomber crews similar to the "tank suit" recently adopted by American aviators. The equipment is designed to give added protection against anti-aircraft shrapnel.

Some Wartime Curbs Will Have to Continue

Seen Necessary by Federal and Private Planners to Prevent Inflationary Scramble.

By James Marlow and George Zieba
Washington, Oct. 13.—How long will rationing, price ceilings and other wartime controls continue after the war ends? A consensus of government and private post-war planners, reported to the Senate's Post-War committees by a subcommittee's investigators, is that some controls will have to continue to prevent an inflationary scramble.

The report speaks of a potential accumulation of 75 billion dollars which otherwise would be turned loose at war's end—large part of which will burn the pockets of the consumers of motor cars, refrigerators, vacuum cleaners and a thousand and one other products whose production has been cut off or greatly restricted by the war.

Then the report says: "All of the agencies interviewed believe that the threat of inflation is so great that wartime control must be continued with gradual relaxation as the stock bins become filled."

Among Questions Raised
Among the questions raised, the investigators report, were these: Without emergency controls, who will get the first 10,000 tons of steel released for public use, or the first 1,000 tons of copper or aluminum, and at what price? Who will get the first 100,000 motor cars or washing machines or vacuum cleaners?

"The conclusion is usually drawn," the report says, "that the big and powerful corporations with their ready purchasing power will get the cream of the trade both in raw materials and the market for finished products after the war unless the controls are continued through the armistice emergency."

Great Explosive Mixture
"It is pointed out that we have a greater explosive mixture than ever before in the history of the country in the form of great civilian scarcities on the one hand and a huge volume of purchasing power on the other, with the two held apart by the wartime controls.

"If these two get together after the war before the levels are equalized by hoarding of goods and control of purchasing power, the explosion may wreck the country," the report says. "As to the length of continuation of emergency controls after the war, or the timing of relaxation of controls, the investigators report no agreement among the planners."

Eight Months
This period might extend many months, perhaps a year or more, he suggested by the portion of the report dealing with the problem of getting peacetime production going again.

Resumption of production in several fields, the investigators say, might be delayed as much as a year if new models were introduced immediately after the war.

The present estimates that 1942 model automobiles can be put into heavy production in six or eight months after the war, but that new models would require at least 18 months to get volume production under way.

The point is made that the moment one producer introduces a new model, the tendency will be for all others to drop their tools and begin planning the new line to keep up with the competitor.

As to distribution, the report declares: "Acute Problem of Timing
"Replenishing retail supplies involves an acute problem of timing in the allocation of materials. Unless some of it is done before the war ends, the service and retail industries may have to wait a year in idleness."

"The first thousand tons of basic raw materials requisitioned must be doled out under rigid rules to prevent a riot."

In conclusion, the report states: "Even at best, six months may be required to get a new start on a substantial scale, and if peace comes soon and suddenly, a year may be required to get our breath."
