Nazis Again Admit Reds Push Ahead; Whole Line Ablaze

Russians Attack in Attempt to Break Narrow Sector Along Sozh River; Soviets Believed Closer to Important Rail Center.

London, Nov. 11.—(AP)—Russian forces a long gage through the wet snow of the western Ukraine toward Poland and Rumania were pushing forward with far superior forces, the German communique said today.

The first battle was reported near the White Russian rail center of Gomel where Berlin said the Russian attacked with numerous rifle divisions, masses of tanks and the first attempt to break a narrow sector of the front along the Sozh river.

The fresh Russian gains, presumably carried on a fresh attack from an extended front, were reported at midnight by Moscow. At that time, the Russians were 42 miles directly west of Kiev and were pushing forward on a 70-mile front.

The German communique acknowledged the Russians had made "local" gains in a fresh attack northeast of the Crimean port of Kerch and told of attacks on the narrow land bridge which the Crimea to the mainland.

Violent Russian attacks in force also were reported by Berlin from the Donets basin near center of Krivoi Rog, northwest of Chornogov above Kiev, and northwest of Smolensk. By German account, the Russian forces had been active in all these engagements but the Nazis insisted they were counter-attacking successfully southwest of Kiev.

Abandoning Huge Stores Plagued by rain, snow and fog of the approaching Russian winter, and reeling under the blows of the Russian forces, the Nazis were abandoning huge stores of war material in their flight, a Soviet communique declared.

Washington, Nov. 11.—(AP)—A relief official accused "a few men in London" today of blocking shipment of food to starving European children and declared that this policy might leave only Germany healthy enough to reconstruct the continent after the war.

The statement was made by Dr. Howard E. Kershner who directed relief for the American Society of Friends in Europe in 1918-19. He told a Senate Foreign Relations subcommittee today that the German people of Europe perished and the Germans alone have the means to reconstruct Europe after the war, the British government will bear the responsibility.

Opposed Feeding Starving. Speaking in a hearing before the Small Democracies, the witness charged that there were several instances in which the British government opposed feeding starving children when the plan involved no moment of food through the blockade.

Southwest Pacific Allied Headquarters, Nov. 11.—(AP)—Powerful reinforcements of regular U. S. Washington, Nov. 11.—(AP)—The German war strength is greater today than in 1939 and Japan still has a mighty warship poised over Asia, a high-ranking U. S. Army chief was quoted as saying today.

The statement was made by Representative Outland (D-Calif.) who said he was quoting Maj. Gen. George V. Strong, chief of the Army's Military Intelligence division, with the general's permission. Outland, overlooking the broad valley leading to Strung, told a secret congressional session several weeks ago.

Simultaneously, the Eighth Army of Gen. Sir Bernard Montgomery, fighting through snowdrifts in the Apennines, advanced five miles and captured Caserta, 10 miles northeast of Naples, and five miles south of Salerno. The Germans had burned and destroyed Salerno.

Eden Hopeful After Amity At Moscow. Gives Common Optimistic Outlook for Full Post-War Cooperation of Big Powers.

London, Nov. 11.—(AP)—In his first public report on the Moscow conference, foreign Secretary Anthony Eden gave Commons today the most optimistic official outlook since the outbreak of the war. He said that the results of the conference were "most encouraging" and that the British government was "most anxious to see the results of the conference put into effect."
